# PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS (1)

Report from the Chair: There have been many issues since the last edition of ECN

The long awaited Planning Appeal Decision for Stroud Rugby Football Club and Squash Club was on 12<sup>th</sup> August. The Inspector dismissed the Appeal and refused planning permission for relocation and provision of new sporting facilities by the two clubs. It was refreshing to see the breadth of support from so many parishioners and the depth of their professional presentations.

As previously promised, the Parish Council has now been able to secure the loan for £40,000 towards the new Community Building at the Owen Harris Memorial Ground. This, together with a similar amount of 'Section 106' money (from the new Cress Nicholson build,) has given timely cash injection to the project. We are delighted to see good progress of the new building.

Millend Mill has finally been granted planning permission for conversion into residential dwellings. We are delighted that a mutually acceptable solution has been found to secure the heritage of the existing historic building and to make it safe. (See KER update). The Appeal against SDC planning refusal to build 4, high density houses on the site of the existing bungalow at 9, Bath Rd., will be determined by written submissions. (Deadline for writing is 30<sup>th</sup> September 2008.)

Good progress has been made with provision of Allotments (thanks to Rob Gothard report below). Although we were progressing well towards purchasing land for this project, unfortunately the land deal fell through. We must now renew our efforts to identify and secure a new piece of land for Allotments. (Provision of Allotment land is a mandatory responsibility of Parish Councils.)

EPC have renewed their commitment to develop their relationship with the Police. An informative and helpful meeting was held with PS Steve Irvin, and together with some other parishioners, we plan to make regular presence and representation at meetings. You are invited to take part.

My thanks to Bill Edwards for his tenacious work as Chair of our Roads and Transport Committee. We hope to appoint a new chair shortly. Bill will have more time now to focus on Footpaths matters.



## PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS (2)

#### **Allotments**

Since the last edition of the Eastington Community News, there has been quite a bit of progress on establishing allotments within the parish. Many of the 20+ people interested in having an allotment met up to start the process of forming an allotments society with the following purpose/aims:

- The Parish Council is responsible for the provision of cultivatable land to be used for allotments; however the gardeners themselves are responsible for turning the land into allotments, the management and maintenance of the allotments and the provision of any facilities they require.
- A society, committee or association is the most effective way to manage the allotments, provide communal facilities, creating a set of rules within which gardeners should participate, setting and collecting of rents, gaining discounts through the bulk purchase of supplies (e.g. seed and manure).

Following our initial meeting, we were hopeful that land adjacent to OHMG would be sold to the Parish Council. Unfortunately, the offer to sell has been withdrawn and the process of identifying and acquiring a suitable piece of land must begin all over again. If you have any ideas for other potential allotment sites in the Village, or you are interested in joining the allotment society please contact me.

## News from KER - Millend Mill - by Tom Low (KER) Tel: 01453 823425

"Good news from Millend - the Mill has had new planning permission for 14 apartments and Hallwave of Bristol, the builders, are ready to make a start. This re-build will retain a big chunk of heritage for our village as well as removing some dangerous masonry from the childrens' walking route to school.

This is a welcome contrast to the previous 2 owners, who were essentially speculators. There remain legal details to settle with Stroud DC, such as paying for footpaths and contributing to education and recreation funds.

Despite the current climate of housing depression, Hallwave are keen to get underway. Their plans are likely to be for 18-24 months work, including demolition, site stabilisation and flood defences. Building the apartments is the easy bit!

Villagers will be meeting with Hallwave to discuss safety elements, affecting both Millenders and families walking to school.

## Severn Vale Biodiversity Project Update: The search for Newts continues

The Severn Vale Biodiversity Project carried out pond surveys in 9 ponds in Eastington over the summer, as part of the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust's "No News is bad newts" project. We found the protected Great Crested Newt in 2 of the ponds surveyed.

Great Crested Newts are the biggest of the 3 existing newt species in this country and need medium sized ponds to survive. They live in pond only for part of the year when they mate and lay their eggs. During the winter newts live on the land under stones or in crevices. As many ponds have disappeared in the last 50 years, populations may have become isolated from each other. Although newts are known to walk up to 1km to find another pond, any further decline in ponds makes these fragmented newt populations very vulnerable. The aim of the survey was to find out where existing populations of Great Crested Newts are in Eastington and the next step is to improve their existing habitats. Even though still fairly common in this country, Great Crested Newts are protected in the whole of Europe, because they are very rare indeed on the continent. (Maybe the rain has got its good sides after all!)

# Eastington Community Centre News.

Work on the new community centre is going well. Anyone travelling north on the M5 can clearly see it, particularly as the roof timbers are now on.

There was a long period during the summer when it seemed that work had come to a standstill. Unfortunately, design issues with the roof and the incredibly wet summer delayed the project. The rain was very frustrating during the holiday season, as the builders could not complete the walls within schedule. Equally, we needed to get the structural integrity of the roof exactly right in order to satisfy our structural engineer. The issues that arose were somewhat frustrating but the structural engineer has now ensured that we have a design that can withstand that 'once in a century' freak gust of wind!

However, work is currently progressing well but the project is now due for completion in May 2009, instead of late March.

Despite the construction delays, we have been very busy during the summer and successfully obtained a grant of £55,000 for the installation of Solar-PV and Solar-Thermal panels. This is courtesy of The Big Lottery and The Low Carbon Buildings Programme and marks a major achievement, given that competition for renewable technologies is very high indeed. The great thing about the installation of these technologies is that it underlines the original intention of the committee to produce a sustainable building that has minimum impact on the environment. These 'green technologies' will allow us to minimise running costs and help to keep hire charges low for everyone in the community.

Furthermore, the whole system will have readouts and data-loggers fitted, which will make information about the energy generated by the solar panels available to all and will be visible within the entrance-hall. This provides a perfect environment for local schoolchildren to visit to learn about environmentally friendly technologies and monitor the heat/power generated. The youngsters of the area will get a head-start in learning about how buildings and new technologies can be kind to the environment; this will give them a good foundation in what will become more a way of life as the years progress.

#### A Word of Warning

We recently experienced a blatant attack of vandalism on the safety fencing within the car park of the grounds. The culprits were identified via the CCTV cameras on the site and we have spoken with those involved. The police are being informed of all acts of vandalism, and provided with CCTV footage, so they will take appropriate action as they see fit. Please inform your children that the building site is a hazardous place and **should not be entered under any circumstances**. Presence on the site, and any damage caused, is likely to result in injury to themselves or others and is therefore incredibly dangerous.
