It can have escaped few people's attention that this Parish is once more the target for massive development. There remain just a few days left now for you to respond to the proposals, and you can do that by phone, on-line or in person – no later than 22^{nd} March. The SDC "Core Strategy" article has been reprinted in ECN again this time, to give those of you who are interested a last chance to take part in this consultation.

If you have internet access, you can read the consultation documents and answer questions online by visiting www.stroud.gov.uk/core

You can get paper consultation response forms and a 'mini guide' to the seven strategies, by calling the District Council's planning strategy team on 01453 754143 or email core@stroud.gov.uk.

If you have already taken a look at the 7 strategies, you might be struggling to identify a single clear option that suits you. At the top of the list is 2000 houses to be located in Cam, Eastington or Eastington. At the other end of the list, is entirely dispersing 2000 houses among the villages. (some planners have already remarked that the latter is unrealistic – in which case one might ask why it was included in that form.)

For each of the 7 options, you may wish to comment about what you do not like and what you do like, or you may favour compiling your own alternative option by 'picking and mixing', or creating your own.

If we grow by another say 50 houses, how would it affect those things we already have? Some things may benefit but some things may become overloaded. For example, what about the sewer capacity? What would happen to the newly rebuilt Village School?

If 2000 more new homes came to any part of Eastington, it and Stonehouse would merge together to be bigger than the principle town of Stroud. And *this* plan is only the next step, so what would be built in the plan after that? What will be the attraction and role of Stroud in 30 years time? Where is the planning vision of first-rate amenities to make Stroud a town we would love to be in? What will be the environmental impact and sustainability green goals for building here by the M5 Junction 13? If the main town grows at Junction 13 instead of Stroud, how many more car journeys will there be to reach Bristol (only 20 minutes away,) or Gloucester, than to reach our local Town of Stroud?

This entire Parish, currently of 680 houses has provided itself with such facilities as the new Community Centre and OHMG Sports Field, and Allotments, and has sustained a wide range of clubs and activities in '4 meeting spaces' (Village Hall, Methodist Hall, Charley Bullock Room,) without the assistance from large scale development. The Parish has one of the Nation's top performing Primary Schools, and has 2 pubs and shops and businesses – all at a time when many other communities are loosing such facilities because of insufficient growth.

What encouraged you to live in Eastington? Our Parish Plan meeting began the process of uncovering what you like about living here, and what you would like to see improved. Would a new town (like Bradley Stoke,) be a better place to live? How much is a sense of 'community' valued by you? Is yours a more imaginative and innovative plan than those in the "Core Strategy"?

I would like to thank the advertisers for supporting Eastington Community News. The money raised from this is our only income, and allows the volunteers to get this publication delivered free to each home in the Parish. I would particularly like to thank Michael Ashworth for negotiating and compiling yet another year of advertising to keep us running. Michael has been doing this job for 10 years now, and is stepping down. Please contact me if you would be prepared to do this essential job in preparing the 'blue' advertising pages for next year – it occurs once a year and can be spread over a couple of months to fit your available time.

We have had a busy February at group, after we survived the onslaught of snow and ice for three consecutive weeks back in January, which put a few members resolutions on hold for a few weeks, before

they could arrive and find out how Slimming World can help them to lose their excess weight and lead healthier lifestyles. We have welcomed many new members to our group from Eastington as well as the surrounding areas.

Slimming World is on a country wide campaign to help the fight back against obesity. Obesity in Britain has tripled in only the last decade with around 30 million adults in Britain (62%) now overweight or obese as well as 1 million children under the age of 16. Slimming World has launched a 12 week community challenge. The winning group has the chance to win £1000 to donate to a charity or project local to that group. The launch of the challenge in Eastington was held 2 weeks ago with a fabulous food tasting evening. Everyone brought a food taster to share with the group and we all set ourselves a weight loss goal, unique to ourselves and sealed it in an envelope which we will receive back at the end of the 12 week challenge. There was also the chance to nominate local groups and projects should we win the prize. So far the group has lost 118lbs (8 stones and 6lbs) in just the first 2 weeks. So a massive well done and thank you for the lovely food tasters. Slimming World helps its members



to lose 17,857 stones every week that's 1 stone 10lbs lost every minute of every day. It's not to late to join, so if you would like to lose weight this spring come and join in with the challenge. Your weight will be kept confidential and you will have support and help every step of the way.

Birder in the Parish

Sunday 24/01. Stunning January morning developing, and drag myself away from marking and head out up river. The mist burns off, the sky clears to clear blue, sun already warming my face as I head for the corner sluice over grass crisp with frost, to look for Chiff Chaffs on the up-river margins.

Still plenty of field pools, the river brown and steamy, wisping up into the paynes grey of the willows, glisteningly atmospheric. Two Missel Thrushes rattle overhead towards Millend Lane, one tempted into song, joining in with the Robins and Song Thrushes already into their dawn chorus. A Chiff Chaff whines directly in front of me, and then another two are gnat catching riverside, ironically able to stay alive through a harsh winter on insects surviving by a river warmed by its journey through the sewage works. A barking dog immediately puts the Chiffs down.

Above the outfall, not one single Chiff Chaff is noted, but a big flock of Fieldfares and Redwings suddenly whiffle down to the tall willows where the river bends left, as if pulled by a magnet; sunlight so strong now, that birds are silhouettes and difficult to i.d. - except for a very obvious, cracking male Bullfinch, perched and calling on top of an alder.

Beyond the meanders, came across two strange looking, thin yellow poles stuck (what appeared to be!) randomly in the field, exactly where the Frome south arm breaks its banks in times of flood. A deep pool, where the river veers hard right, has silted up over the years, the old workings taken out of the river to strengthen the flow to the Millend mill race having long been flattened, so there is now no barrier against the flow, which then spills out over the east meadows, tracking the shallow field drains towards Millend Lane.

A woman, whom I hadn't even noticed in the dark corner of the meadow where sits the pill-box, with five dogs in tow, striding towards me gesticulating, shouting, warning, with a stream of expletives, demanding her sticks. My initial apologies for not knowing what they were or who they belonged to,

seemed quite feeble against this tirade of foul-mouthed verbals. But I think I gave as good as I got. Her dogs, which were amazingly obedient and attentive to her every word, ignored me totally. In afterthought, it did seem a pity she couldn't seem to communicate as well with this fellow human, as she obviously does with them.

I left her to her little world, and went back to mine, searching the dips and field drains, still water filled, for Snipe or Meadow Pipits. Of course, there would be none, all wildlife seeing the domestic dog as a top predator, and flushing to cover. But a day for careful observing, and absorbing this lovely January morning, the sun warm to the skin, but also the threat of cloud from the west, moving high but slowly so still hope for the chance of arm-chair birding and a sun-bathe in the back garden, with a decent coffee, and 'bins' at hand.

On the 7th, first of the New Year's spiders on the move in the house. I'm getting to know one in particular which has been sitting in the bedroom window next to my desk, and hasn't moved a millimetre for the past week. I don't mind her sharing my space and as I check her out, and open the window to hear the Tawny Owl, she reacts to the sudden flush of cold air by cringing up ever so slightly.

At the back end of Autumn, was often woken at first light by three Tawnys, hooting and wicking from both sides of the cottage, before they settled down to roost for the day. Now, just the one male remains. Ornithology has only very recently affirmed that the female Tawny 'kewicks' (the well phrased 'tu'whit'), and the male responds with 'whoo, whoo, tu-whoo'; but, as always in the world of birds, things ain't that simple, and if you are fortunate enough to have one really close when it calls, that single bird can do both - most probably a female, but not as full and deep as the male. Keep a look out for them now, they are early breeders, having eggs in the nest by early March, and naturally keeping a very low profile, though they will continue to call through to May. They fall silent in the moult from June to end of August, but listen out for the rasping squeak of young birds at this time, calling for food throughout the night. My bird's gone guiet, so obviously off hunting.

Good to have at least one owl species in the Parish, but then, not that good, when six species have been recorded fairly regularly in the County - Eagle, Long-eared, Short-eared, Tawny, Barn and Little, and only four of these breeding. Last year, an Eagle Owl was seen regularly visiting the Barn

Male Tawny Owl calling tonight, and with the slightest sliver of a new moon hanging low down in the south west. My spider hasn't moved an inch for over two weeks.


TEAS (The Eastington Allotment Society)

Core Strategy Consultation:
Alternative Strategies for shaping the future of Stroud District.

Between Monday 8th February and Monday 22nd March, we all have a chance to comment on the future growth and development of Stroud District. As part of a new planning framework, which will eventually replace the district's Local Plan, the District Council is producing a document called the Core Strategy. This will be a plan that sets out how much new development should take place across the district over the next 20 years and, in very general terms, what should go where.

The District Council is publishing a range of possible routes that it could take in order to accommodate around 2,000 additional homes by 2026, as well as encouraging the generation of about two new jobs for every new household built. The challenge facing the Council is to ensure that future growth is managed in a sustainable way, making provision for homes, jobs and community facilities, whilst at the same time protecting and improving our environment. Should there be an urban focus for development (e.g. around the Gloucester fringe, Stroud, Stonehouse, Cam and Dursley)? Would it be best to have just one or two big developments or would it be more sustainable to disperse new development around smaller settlements and rural areas? Or should there be a mixture of these various approaches?

Each of the seven "alternative strategies" offers a way for the Council to meet its targets, but every one of them has pros and cons. The Council is inviting anyone that lives, works or invests in Stroud District to take part in this consultation and to make their views known, so that it can refine the various options and come up with the best possible solution for the District. The Core Strategy will not be finally adopted until next year and there are several more stages of consultation before then – but this is possibly the most important stage, because it will shape the overall direction for growth and development.

If not, documents will be available to view throughout the consultation period at all town and parish council offices that open to the public as well as public libraries across the district. They will also be available to view at the tourist information centre at the Stroud Subscription Rooms and the customer service centre at the District Council offices, Ebley Mill (there are computers for public internet access there as well).

You can get consultation response forms and a 'mini guide' to the seven strategies from any of these locations or call the Council's planning strategy team on <u>01453 754143</u> or email <u>core@stroud.gov.uk</u>. There will also be a series of public exhibitions across the district, where you can chat to officers involved, as well as events targeted specifically at the business community and young people. If you are interested in participating in either of these or to find out about dates and venues for the public exhibitions, see the council's website, the mini guide or contact the planning strategy team.

Digital Switchover Update

Did you know that for some people reading the Eastington Community News you may be switching to digital television as soon as **Wednesday 24 March 2010?**

Those readers receiving their signal from the Mendip transmitter or one of its smaller relay transmitters and watching BBC Points West from Bristol will be affected at this time.

However, for other readers of The Eastington Community News, you won't switch from analogue to digital television until **2011** – that's if you receive your signal from the Ridge Hill West transmitter.

You can check exactly when you switch by visiting www.digitaluk.co.uk/postcodechecker and entering your postcode and house number.

Every household will need to make sure that all their televisions will be able to receive a digital signal either through an aerial (Freeview), satellite dish, cable or broadband.

The digital signal will provide a boost to many aerials which are currently not able to receive Freeview. Freesat delivers digital TV channels through a satellite dish without having to pay a subscription, for those not able to receive digital TV through an aerial.

Older and disabled people can receive special support. You are eligible for the Switchover Help Scheme if you: are 75 or over; receive certain disability benefits; live permanently in a care home; or are blind or partially sighted. Police have charged two people with burglary following an incident at an Eastington address.

On January 31 officers received a report that someone had forced entry to the empty property and that a number of belongings had been removed.

Officers investigating the burglary have recovered a number of the stolen items and a man and a woman, both aged 41, were arrested yesterday afternoon. They have been charged with dwelling burglary and theft. They have been bailed to appear at Stroud Magistrates Court on March 3.

The panel then reviewed the results of the recent community engagement process, in which concerns were put forward by local residents. The panel decided that for the next few months, your Safer Community Team's main priority will be to combat anti-social behaviour in Eastington.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS NEWSLETTER

DISTRICT COUNCIL BUDGET

I was unable to attend the budget setting meeting. If I had been present I would have voted against it. To have an increase of 1.9% sounds very laudable in the present economic climate. The trouble is there were also many hundreds of thousands of pounds of budget cuts included as well. My opinion is that if budget cuts are proposed then they should be clearly defined when passing the budget. In this one I do not think this was the case and where these cuts will take place will only be known when the money is withdrawn. I think it is not being very honest to do things this way.

CORE STRATEGY CONSULTATION

I mentioned this in my last newsletter. The consultation period has now started. I consider this to be a very important period for the Parish if it wants to promote itself as staying a rural parish. The Parish Council has decided to engage a planning professional to respond on behalf on the Parish. As someone who hears things said by other district councillors up to and including cabinet level I consider this to be a very sensible and prudent decision. We need to have the best advice and help available to combat the inevitable pressure that our parish will come under during this and the next phase of the process.

WASTE INCINERATOR PROPOSALS

The proposed incinerator at Javelin Park of even in our parish was the main topic at a meeting I attended recently. This was a presentation by a world renowned specialist on the subject. It obtained much press coverage. Anyone attending this presentation would I suggest have found it

very difficult to leave the meeting without major concerns on the impact any such incinerator would have on both the local and greater countryside and population. I am more than ever totally opposed to such a facility being build either within or next to our parish or in fact in anybody's backyard. There is a viable and proven alternative.

SHELTERED HOUSING PROVISION REVIEW

The District Council is holding a major review on its sheltered housing provision. I know that many many residents in sheltered housing are very concerned at both the proposals being put forward and the process as a whole. I attended a Housing Forum meeting on this subject recently. When I read the paper up for discussion my first reaction was 'where's the rest of it'. It seemed a very thin paper for such an important subject. At this meeting I was 'advised' that if I expressed an opinion at this stage I may well be considered to have



compromised my position and unable to vote at a later date. I am used to this in planning applications but on a matter like this no. Seemed rather odd to me but given the attitude taken to housing provision within the council lately perhaps not. I intend to keep working with the affected tenants so that their opinions and aims are promoted fully.

LOST PLANNING APPEAL ON 'FOX'S FIELD'

You may have read about this. The potential major impact it may have on the District Councils ability to enforce the provisions in the current local plan has yet to be fully identified. The fact that the District Council lost this appeal, will not, I think come as a surprise to parishioners who attended the appeal on the Rugby Club application at Churchend. I asked several times after this appeal for a meeting in public to review the District Councils performance at that appeal. This was to see if lessons could be learned and appropriate action taken to enhance performance if thought necessary. No such meeting was ever held.


