Parking on pavements and in bus stops continues to be a problem along Alkerton Road. This is likely to pose problems in a number of areas. From our local businesses perspective, they will lose trade if cars are unable to find short stay parking spaces. Disabled people, and those less steady on their feet, are significantly inconvenienced by the above obstructions. Serious parking congestion in Churchend also continues to present high risk to road users. If we cannot get voluntary solution to this problem, then formal parking restrictions will become the next step.

THE VILLAGE HALL

1. A brief history

The Hall was built in 1927 to a design by a Stroud architect, Mr Vernon Barnes LRIBA on land donated by Mr James Warner of Alkerton. A Trust was formed, the building and land vested in that trust and registered with the Charity Commission. The original trustees were Claude D'Arcy Stratton De Lisle Bush of Eastington Park, James Hargreaves Turner of Alkerton Grange, John Langston Warner of Millend, Joseph Moore of Eastington, Frank Broomhall of Eastington and Octavius Hulbert of Claypits. The funding for the construction of the Hall was by subscription which amounted to the princely sum of £990.13s.01d at the date of the execution of the deeds.

The Trust was created to provide for the education and mental improvement, recreation and general benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Eastington.

Like most community facilities the Hall has had its ups and downs but has emerged looking better than ever.

2. A recent development

A very interesting print of an engraving by Kip entitled "Eastington Estate of Nathaniel Stevens" has recently resurfaced after being missing presumed lost for many years. The print was apparently donated to the Village Hall in October 1932 by H E Hawker of Stonehouse. The print is currently being framed and will be hung in the Hall for all to see.

3. Our Refurbishment

As previously reported the Hall has been undergoing extensive improvement and refurbishment work over the past two years and this is now complete. We would like all parishioners to witness the transformation and will be organising an open event in the near future.

The Hall now ranks among the best in Gloucestershire and is a building of which you can all be proud.

4. Use of Hall

Stroud Valleys Project- Biodiversity Update

Eastington is lucky to have a few protected species in the parish. Now is a good time to observe one of them, the Great Crested Newt *Triturus cristatus*. This is the biggest of Britain's three newt species and is the only one that is protected by law, as their numbers are dwindling. Adult newts are back from their hibernation place on land in ponds and the females lay their eggs on leaves, which they fold over carefully If you want to know whether you have Great Crested Newts in your pond, the best way to find out is to go out with a torch in the dark and check whether you can see any newts in your pond, as they are most active at night. If you do find any, make sure you don't shine your torch on them for too long, as this may disturb them.

You will recognize the Great Crested Newt by its size (up to 16 cm long, both other species are up to 10 cm long), and males have a crest on their back, that dips at the end of the body and starts again over the tail (male smooth newts also have a crest, but theirs is continuous one). You can also look for their eggs on leafy water plants like water mint or Brooklime and often you can see the folded leaves. It would be great to hear from you if you find them in your garden. You can e-mail me at Nadine@stroudvalleysproject.org.

We would also like to get a group of people together who would be willing to manage the new Community Pond area at the allotment site as a thriving wildlife area. This would involve an hour work twice or three times a year. If you are willing to help with this, we will make a start on **Thursday 17th June at 7pm** at the pond on the allotment. There will also be some pond dipping for the children. Eastington Methodist Church

One of the things we know about God is that he expects change. He expects us to change as individuals and for the church to change too. At Eastington Methodist Church, there have been many changes over the years and what we do changes from time to time to adapt to new circumstances and opportunities.

Some truths are eternal and there has been friction between the many parts of the church and some of the politicians and pressure groups who have tried to impose their own views of right and wrong upon deeply held beliefs of many Christians. There are standards which we, as Christians, are called to uphold even if we struggle at times or fail to always meet them ourselves. Just because one section of the community doesn't like some of them or even if these standards are regarded as old fashioned, we cannot accept that such views can turn wrong into right.

If you want to understand better where the church is coming from or even want the opportunity to debate it and put forward your own thoughts, there is something called the Alpha Course which could be just right for you. We are anticipating running the course of 10 Alpha sessions in the autumn on Tuesday evenings. Please look out for the details later in the year.

One of the more recent changes has been to start the main Sunday Morning services with a time of worship music led by the young people. Many village churches have no young people at all and often no children either with some closing due to ageing and dwindling congregations. We are so grateful that this has not happened here and believe that God has special plans for Eastington.

In another rather more mundane change, the daytime Bible Study has moved from Thursdays to 1pm on Tuesdays.

As we approach summer, a programme of activities is being prepared for families, children and young people. This will include various outings, sleepovers and other events. Ones of particular note are:

We have been busy making the most of the sunny weather and have been playing both inside and out in supervised free-flow play. The children have been very interested in finding bugs and insects outside and we have been looking at snail trails, slime, patterns and where insects live and what they like to eat.

We have also been digging, filling and emptying containers with compost, planting sunflower seeds to enable us to see how a seed grows, what it needs to promote this growth, and then we will be able to measure the plants, take photographs and record how big our flowers grow. Our children will then take the sunflowers home to look after and return to playgroup to tell us how big their plant has grown! We will also be visiting our 'garden' to plant and grow other seeds, and also to play in 'Percy's Hut' which the children love.

We are also linking our sessions to the children's other interests at Playgroup which at present is super heroes. We will be supporting this by offering a box of props for the children to use which encourages their imaginations. The box may contain different materials of colours and sizes, maps, clips boards with paper and pens, tubes, shells, beads and jewellery. The box contents will be varied to promote social skills, communication literacy and language, knowledge and understanding, creativity as well as their problem solving and numeracy skills.

We have started our Pre-School sessions at Eastington Primary School which are on Wednesday afternoons which helps the children prepare for school in September. By holding this session at the school the children get used to their new surroundings, meet the older children and their new teachers.

If you would like your child to enjoy a stimulating, fun and safe environment to learn and play in then we would love to hear from you – we take children from 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years to 4 years 11 months and we accept government nursery vouchers and other types of employer supported childcare vouchers.

Birder in the Parish

28/02. For the first time in a month, no sign of my spider in the window. Possibly the increased daylight and temperature have sent her off to set up her web for the spring and summer. A queen wasp came into the conservatory last week, more gnat clouds are in nuptial flight, and a skylark flew over the cottages this morning in song, heading for the top Eastington meadows out towards the A38, all very good signs of improving weather. Chiff Chaffs also singing and a male Blackcap in sub-song.

Slowly but surely, spring plants are emerging, including some very early crocuses but which were unfortunately knocked back by still very cold nights. Lot of hazel catkins showing.

Can't wait for warm, late summer nights, when it will be time to get the moth trap out. Compiling a very respectable Parish list after less than a year as a novice trapper, with some very handsome moth species as the highlights, including two superb Poplar Hawkmoths and a delightful creature called a Canary-shouldered Flame. Fascinating pastime, made all the more interesting because of its nocturnal nature and never knowing what might turn up in the trap. Still aware that a brilliantly bright mercury vapour lamp could be classed as anti-social, but no complaints so far, and anyway, it's all in the furtherance of science!

01/03. Fantastic day, clear blue sky, temperatures somewhere over at least 10C - relatively balmy! Early

crocuses completely open in the garden, attracting two hover flies, species not known. Ladybirds on the move everywhere, a caterpillar on the hellebore (looks like Muslin Moth) and clouds of gnats.

Birder in the Parish continued /

Only two Longtailed Tits left now from the winter gang of up to twenty that visited the feeders twice a day from early December; these two are obviously a pair and will have already started their nest building. Only two male Blackbirds left from the continental birds which were also here at the feeders all through the winter; these two are resident birds and will soon start to breed. No sign of Song Thrushes.

Strands of spider silk glisten on every plant, the slightest breeze betraying their presence with shimmers of iridescence - it's that kind of early Spring day when I suddenly want to do so many things outdoors, but am resisting the temptation to zoom off with the telescope to the Severn at Fretherne for a big spring tide of over ten metres!

06/03. Saw a dead Barn Owl roadside just up the A38 from Cambridge. Got out of the car at the lay-by and went to investigate. Barn Owls are uncommon in the County and it is distressing to find one recently dead. From the strong ochre colouring on the upperparts, this was a female. She is very light, and there is no substance to her body, showing malnutrition. Such a beautiful bird, but her tail, rump, under tail coverts and her white 'stockinged' legs were messy - she had obviously been hunting in long, wet grass and without much success. Barn Owls depend heavily on the field

vole population to survive, a particular link in the food chain which was badly hit by the prolonged winter.

11/03. First Common Frog this year in the garden pond, croaking well into the night.

On the 12th, nipped over to Clearwater Drive in Quedgley to look for Jack Snipe and flushed a single bird at 6.40 a.m. before heading into work. This bird made a quiet call as it flew which is unusual for this species. Good to see them at last turning up in the County this early Spring on their way north to their breeding haunts. There are migrants slowly but surely making their way here on their northerly migration, the pager showing records of a Sand Martin in the water park and the first Swallow and Wheatear on the south coast.

Next morning, away at 5.30 a.m. with John down to The Fleet to twitch the Bufflehead. Arrived just after 7.30, a cloudy start turning into a beautiful early Spring day, cloud pushed west by a north easterly. Cracking bird and very good views as it dived to feed on flat calm. The Bufflehead is an exotic looking north American duck, with striking black and white plumage and a very rare bird for the UK and would normally be considered an 'escape' - a bird from a collection that has gone feral - but this one was behaving like a wild bird, getting very twitchy indeed about some kayakers coming up the Fleet and taking wing when they were hundreds of yards away.

15/03. New moon. Early day with veiled sunshine turning cloudy. First honey bees taking pollen from crocuses. First queen bumble bee of the year. Blue tit investigating nest box on shed, but not going in. Checked it out and found three decayed chicks from last year and nest material crawling with fleas. Thorough clean out. At least three chicks fledged last year so probably starvation took its toll during the heat wave in June. Chiff Chaff singing - incoming migrant.

Birder in the Parish continued /

- 19/03. Winds at last from the south west with mild rain and sudden influx of migrants with first Sand Martins and a Swallow in the county. Pallid Swift, Hoopoe, Alpine Swift and Black Kite in the south of UK.
- 20/03. Male spider feeding on a large Ladybird on the window frame; not sure where such a small spider puts all that body fluid!

Chaffinch flock still at the feeders including the white headed bird.

- 21/03. Woke to the sonorous chimes of a Collared Dove. Two Brimstone butterflies today and a female Blackbird carrying nest material. Carrion Crows nest building in the back willows, and two Roe Deer across the meadow. Cuckoo reported at Roel Gate earliest ever County record.
- 24/03. Sudden weather change from the south. This will definitely bring birds into the Parish and am expecting the first Swallows soon, and singing Willow Warblers my touchstone bird for start of summer!
- 25/03. Ten Swallows at Millend with their astonishing, exuberant, indulgent flight, so completely different from any flight pattern of our wintering birds just love 'em! They are so fast, in and out of willows, skimming, twisting, then their sudden alarm call as a Sparrowhawk makes a stoop with short pursuit and misses. The group rises, calling their Sparrowhawk alarm. Only three of our raptors can catch them, the Sparrowhawk struggles but has the ability to pounce from cover and

snatch the unwary; the Hobby is a master hirundine catcher, perfectly agile enough to pursue and take Swifts also, and bats; and the magician - the Merlin, which pursues relentlessly and is agile and fast enough to easily take a Swallow.

QuickTime™ and a decompressor are needed to see this picture.

28/03. Nipped down to Saul Warth to tick Garganey pair, and next day, a further eighteen Swallows at Millend.

31/03. First Willow Warbler of the year, and now twenty Swallows,

then next day, twenty five Swallows and two House Martins, with three White Wagtails at Claypits and a Little Gull on Townfield Lake.

03/04. With John, Mike and Paul to twitch the Pallid Swift at Kessingland and possible Lesser Kestrel at Minsmere. Left pub at 11.05 pm Friday evening, driving through the night with all passengers in snoring mode, arriving Kessingland at 03.20. Fantastic close views of hunting Barn Owls until the bird showed beautifully at just after 8 am. Then on to Westleton Heath/Minsmere area for Lesser Kestrel which did not show after prolonged search.

05/04. Blue Tits fumbling unwieldy nest material into nest box.

09/04. Lovely weather! Migration now well under way, plants growing apace. Nipped down to WWT to watch two Avocets which were making tentative nest building attempts.

10/04. Watched five Ring Ouzels on Cleeve, with Grasshopper Warbler, Cuckoo and an immaculate male Redstart. Very warm in the sun but still cold breeze from the north. By the 13th, the wind had turned bone-chillingly cold but birds still struggling on migration, with reports of Arctic Skuas moving up the Severn estuary.

Cotswold Canals Update

The Phase 1A project to restore the 6 miles of canal between the Ocean at Stonehouse and Brimscombe Port is beginning to manifest itself in the form of works on the ground. The contract to build the new A46 bridge in the middle of Stroud was let recently and work should be starting at about the time you read this.

The reeds that were growing right across the canal in several places in Stonehouse which were choking off the water supply to the section of canal here in Eastington were removed over the winter. Works are also proceeding to upgrade the towpath starting near St Cyr's church and working eastwards.

Other projects should start soon with the new Upper Mills Bridge awaiting relocation scheme for some badgers which took up residence on the site over the winter. Dredging between The Ocean and Ryeford Double Lock should start soon as well as the restoration of that lock.

At the Eastington Depot, the Cotswold Canals Trust volunteers are well advanced in the building of a new public trip boat. This is in preparation for the resumption of trip operations at Eastington this summer for the first time in quite a while.

As the locks have not been used for a couple of years, it was thought wise to check them out. When the volunteers tried to use Blunder Lock, the heel post of one of the top gates split revealing that the wood inside has been well chewed by wood boring insects. These gates are made of English Oak and it has deteriorated far quicker than the type of timber used in the

gates at Newtown Lock. It is unlikely that the other Blunder Lock gates are in a much better state so it looks like the whole set will need to be replaced at an anticipated cost of £30,000. Finding this amount of money in the context of the existing commitments given to fund the Phase 1A project is going to be a challenge.

The CCT dredger has been refurbished and is fully working. It appeared on a recent BBC Countryfile TV programme as part of a piece about the restoration of the Cotswold Canals. Crews of volunteers are now being trained how to use it prior to its deployment elsewhere on the canal.

Prior to it leaving Eastington, it is planned to use the dredger to clear debris out of both Blunder and Newtown Locks but, as it is in the pound below Blunder Lock, it will not be able to do so until the lock is repaired.

There are many opportunities to get involved in the canal restoration project. Practical work takes place on Mondays and Wednesdays using the Eastington Depot next to Pike Bridge as the base. Other work takes place at weekends up and down the canal.

There are lots of other activities including fund raising, project management and design work, sales, promotion and PR type work as well as historical research, archaeology and archiving type projects.
