2010 has marked the Centenary of Guiding and there have been many exciting activities for the Brownies too. You can catch up with their activities on Pg 11. There will be plenty happening for the Bluebells: a musical quiz 16th November and Eastington school children visit 7th December.

One year after the first dig, there is a review of progress at the Allotments on pg 13. A free "chipping" and "shredding" service has been organised for you, Saturday 20th November 9.00 am to midday at the Allotment site. Please bring along your woody garden waste.

The next step for the Community Orchard Scheme (pg 10) is to meet with all interested volunteers to share opinions and ideas on Thursday, November 25th at 7.30 at Eastington Community Centre.

Eastington still features high among favoured locations for large housing development. It seems that Stroud District Council (SDC) continue with two options of their "Core Strategy" that would more than double the size our Village. For more on this see your District Councillor's letter pg 2.

Feeling "safe" is cited as a high priority by many residents. Intimidation and anti-social behaviour are a common theme underlying such worries. The Police are aware of many of these problems and as part of the "Safer Communities" scheme, they have again provided a survey form on page 17 to collect your views and concerns.

At Parish Council the present focus has been to set the Precept for 2011-2012 and to review priorities within the budget. This is a difficult task given the current National austerity measures. However, it is the duty of the Parish Council to raise sufficient money to provide essential services. Clearly, some things that it would like to do will not be affordable, and other ways of raising money will need investigating in order to accomplish these. October was the first of three Parish Council meetings in the delightfully modern School Hall. The School Council will join the December meeting and it is hoped that some members of the public will also attend. (7pm Tuesday 14th December.)

Thank you to everyone who attended the *1st Birthday Fun Day* on 19th September at the Owen Harris Memorial Ground (OHMG), and especially to all who helped organise, prepare or clear up afterwards. It was a great success following our *Vibrant Village* accolade, and showed we are well capable of making this an annual event. There was a good response to the 'mini questionnaire' and this gave several clear indications of important issues in the Village to take forward into the Parish Plan.

Can you meet the "Waste Reduction Challenge" to reduce the vast volume of waste going into landfill? (pg 15) 20th-28th Nov, people across the county are being invited to sign-up to at least one pledge to cut household waste. The recent disaster in Hungary at an Aluminium plant underlines our huge demand for this energy intensive metal. By recycling cans you will help reduce demand.

It's good to hear brighter news about restoring the canal through Eastington, and an update about progress in Stroud (pg 5). Awareness of benefits to the wider communities is steadily growing.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S NEWSLETTER

CORE STRATEGY

This is, amongst other things, the mechanism that will decide where/how the next housing allocation will be made. The cabinet has decided that although the Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS) has been abolished by the government they will continue with the overall housing allocation numbers that it produced. In doing this they also hope that about 750 of these can be distributed to the Gloucester-Cheltenham SSCT (Strategically Significant Cities and Towns) area. Only time will tell if this is possible. I for one am not holding my breath. The cabinet also decided 'That future work on the Core Strategy should be directed towards focusing development at one or more of the locations in Alternative Strategies A,B and D whilst developing the localism agenda'. To remind you:

Strategy Option A is a single concentration of 2000 homes and supporting structure and employment premises in one place.

Strategy Option B is splitting the 2000 homes, supporting infrastructure and employment premises across two locations.

Strategy Option D is the Stroud Valleys strategy of scattering the 2000 across a number of sites, with some degree of focus on the canal corridor.

Eastington features significantly in all three of these, especially in options A and B. At the cabinet meeting the decision was made at I asked the question 'Why not say the work is to cover all sites in consultation document? This wording suggests to me that there is a preferred option/site in somebody's mind. At least one Parish Council in a very measured response in the consultation process (this was Eastington) suggested there were other sites within the district, not mentioned in the consultation process, quite able to provide housing in the numbers mentioned. Have these sites/parishes been included in the alternative strategies locations? If not will a report ever be produced explaining the rationale behind not including the proposals in the continuing work?' I suggest you look at the web cast of the meeting to hear what the reply was. I did not draw much comfort from it.

PLANNING SCHEME OF DELEGATION

This subject has been ongoing for almost two years. The cabinet will be recommending changes to the existing scheme at the next full council meeting later in November. At present if certain circumstances are met the opinion of affected neighbours (and other members of the general public) and Parish Councils can ensure that a decision on an application will be made in public by elected councillors at a Development Control Committee meeting (DCC). The proposals would end this situation. Also at present the local ward member (councillor) can request that an application be removed from delegated authority and be determined by the DCC. This request if supported by valid planning reasons will also automatically ensure that it is sent to DCC. This automatic referral is also proposed to cease. My personal opinions on the proposals are that they reduce the level of public involvement in the planning process. I also have other concerns on the proposals. I intend to speak against the proposals as tabled and will report back on the outcome of the debate in my next report.

BUDGET CUTS

It appears that the government review is what was expected in terms of cuts to local government but as they say, 'the devil is in the detail' and SDC will not know its specific grant settlement until early December. Hopefully by then we will also have more detail on the planning arrangements that will replace the RSS and a definition of 'localism' and other buzz words floating about.

Dear All

Another busy academic year is underway and the happy industry continues with a whole range of activities planned in support of the children's learning.

On the field of play.....

Our sporting achievements to date include an excellent team effort in the Stroud 6-a-side football tournament finishing runners up to Minchinhampton Primary. Eastington is currently involved in a mini football league competing against schools within the Stroud area. Good luck to all. Our cross country team have enjoyed some fantastic results with 6 top ten finishes in the junior events and our Year 2 (infants) proving outright winners during a multi race event at Maidenhill School. More recently, Eastington won the school team Silver Mile event as part of the Stroud half marathon. Many extra curricular activities continue with tag rugby, hockey, cross country, football and multi sports to name but a few!

Visitors to the school

We welcomed officers from the Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service, who reminded the children about safety. We have also been helping with the training of police personnel who 'practiced' their questioning techniques on some of our younger children.....this proved quite a challenge for the officers! All children in the junior classes thoroughly enjoyed the techniques of screen printing in support of their project on William Morris. Workshops were led by local artist, Alison Vickery and provided an opportunity for the children to understand the printing process with some stunning results. Members of the Methodist Church have delighted us this term with interactive stories from the Bible and Rev. Amys continues to take a lead with some of our themed assemblies.

Rights and responsibilities

We are currently involved with the Rights Respecting Schools Award. This initiative, headed by UNICEF, aims to help children interpret the 42 Articles of Human Rights through developing an understanding of the 'responsibilities' that underpin the Rights of an individual person. Working with a small number of schools within the Stroud area the children have already implemented classroom and playground Charters that highlight their responsibilities as young people. A steering group led by children, staff and governors is working closely with the rest of the school community to raise awareness and improve our understanding of the world in which we live.

Our first 'proposal'!

As some of you may have read in the local and national press, one of our members of staff, Miss Wall received a proposal of marriage from her fiancé in front of her class! What she did not know was that the children had a hand in proceedings by posing the question on behalf of her fiancé who then appeared from a store cupboard, ring in hand! Having said 'yes', the couple are planning to marry next spring.....aah!

Out and about

Some of our older children have enjoyed dance workshops at Rednock School with our younger learners participating in shared sporting events at Maidenhill School. We continue to promote local history with Classes 1 and 2 undertaking a project about houses and homes in Eastington, whilst Mr Dougan (staff member), continues to share his expertise of local wildlife during weekly 'nature' walks. All children in Years 5 and 6 also participate in a 5 week digital photography

course – with some superb results. Last year, Amelia Dive became Gloucestershire's Young Photographer of the Year and featured in Cotswold Life! This year, we are looking forward to strengthening our involvement with many local projects including the Eastington Community pond group, the Allotment Association and the Community Orchards initiative.

We have recently forged a special link with Charles Dickens Primary, an inner city school in Southwark, central London. We enjoyed an absolutely wonderful morning when our friends came to visit Eastington and shared experiences with their new found 'pen pals' from Years 5 and 6. We swapped ideas, sang songs and smiled a great deal in the knowledge that real community cohesion can be achieved and we are all 'richer' for having had the experience. We hope to see our friends again in the spring term when we are planning to spend a day in London. I may be old fashioned but it is so good to see the excitement of children writing and receiving letters rather than emails or texts!

Forthcoming projects and events

We are planning to construct an outside learning area between Classes 1 and 2. This will be used to extend opportunities for the children to develop their imagination, engage in role play and learn how to keep safe. Representatives on the school council have also contributed to the design of a shaded area to be installed in the main playground later in the year.

The Parish Council continue their 'tour' of the village and are holding their next 2 meetings at School – Tuesday 9th November and on Tuesday 14th December (school hall 7.00pm) All are most welcome.

We hope to see you all on **SUNDAY 5TH DECEMBER AT THE SCHOOL CHRISTMAS BAZAAR**. All the usual festive stalls and activities will be on offer including a promised visit from Father Christmas who is popping in to school during his busy schedule. Come and join us for a mince pie and glass of mulled wine. From 12.00pm onwards.

What next....

As many of you will have already noted the pressures on public spending and the changing role of the Local Authority that will inevitably see many adjustments to the provision offered to our young learners. I do believe, however, having been in education for 31 years (including 20 years at Eastington!) that it continues to be a dynamic process and our village primary school will remain a great place to grow, learn and develop.

Come and Enjoy - First Session Free !



Over the past few months, few can have failed to notice the work going on to restore the Cotswold Canals through the centre of Stroud and elsewhere.

The A46 bridge construction is well advanced and is part of the Phase 1A project to restore the 6 miles of canal between the Ocean at Stonehouse and Brimscombe Port. The Trust has a new visitor centre overlooking the A46 bridge works at Bell House (formerly the Bell Hotel) which is open various days of the week. It is well worth popping in to see the displays if you happen to be in Stroud. Work is also substantially underway at Ryeford Double Lock and at Upper Mills Bridge as part of the work being managed by Stroud District Council and supported by Heritage Lottery funding,

One or two of you may have noticed the disappearance of the Trust's green dredger which has, for many years, been inactive and moored at Eastington. Last year, a considerable amount of work was undertaken to refurbish and update it with much of the cost being covered by Stroud District Council in anticipation of its use for dredging work on Phase 1A.

As no part of Phase 1A is ready for it to be used yet, it was decided to take it to the eastern side of the canal where a dredging project was ready to go. This has provided the opportunity to train up volunteers from all along the canal in its use as well as to clear a very silted up section that went out of use nearly 100 years ago. Being in a rural location, it was possible to augment the work of the floating dredger with that of a large hired digger working from the bank.

Eastington lies within the 4 mile section of canal defined as Phase 1B which will link the Phase 1A length with the Gloucester & Sharpness Canal at Saul Junction. All of the technical issues are well understood and preliminary designs exist for this whole length. The big issue is money but there are now indications that the Heritage Lottery Fund would consider an application from the Cotswold Canals Partnership to cover Phase 1B. A successful bid would be a big step forward but these grants only cover part of the cost and matched funding is also needed. In the case of Phase 1B, this will run into several £million. In an environment of squeezed public funding, this will be a challenge but volunteer input does count as "in kind" funding (as well as having the effect of reducing the cost) so we will be looking at maximising this. On balance, the general problem of securing matched funding might actually benefit the canal project by adversely affecting competing projects seeking the same lottery grants. As to the timing of all this, it is not clear at the moment but there would be a clear advantage if Phase 1B were able to run contiguously with Phase 1A without a gap in the work.

We are still trying to find a solution to the need to replace the gates at Blunder Lock on the Eastington flight. The cost of replacing and fitting a new set of gates turned out to be of the order of £43,000, which is rather more than we were hoping for, and this level of funding is not currently available. The Parish Council has offered to assist, for which we are very grateful, but the bulk of the funding still has to be found before progress can be made. We would, of course, welcome the involvement of one or more local sponsors if there is anyone out there interested.

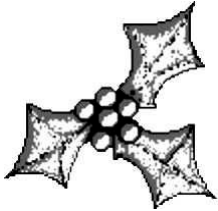

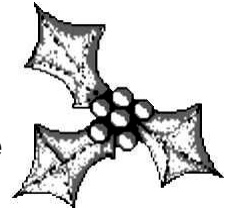

Eastington Methodist Church

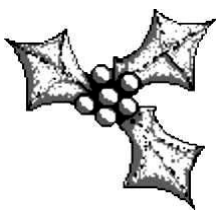


Christmas is not that far away now so below is what we are doing this year:



On Sunday 12th December at 11am we are having another Messy Church. This is a very hands-on type of service suitable for all ages with lots to do and get involved with. Last time we made decorative things and cooked mince pies amongst other things. As usual, our music group will be present and Howard Miles will be leading our time together.

The evening of Sunday 19th at 6pm is our carols by candlelight. There will still be many of the traditional carols but we will be deviating slightly from the 9 lessons and carols format. The service is earlier than usual because we hope that this will be easier for people who want to bring children. There will be refreshments afterwards.



Then on Christmas Day we will have a family service at 10:30am, led by Beck Burgin, where we will be celebrating the birth of Jesus.



Over the last few weeks, we have been running an Alpha Course at the Kings Head on Tuesday Evenings at 7pm. Each session has included a video, discussion and a meal. About a dozen have been coming along and we hope that everyone has found the sessions interesting and thought provoking. To do Alpha properly requires quite a commitment of time over a period of weeks. We are starting to consider what next and are considering arranging some stand alone meetings, perhaps monthly, aimed at exploring, discussing and perhaps even arguing about some of the really big questions, such as "Why does God allow bad things to happen?" Many people ask themselves this sort of question and, in the absence of an answer that makes sense, are unable or unwilling to move forward. If you have just such a question on your mind, why not drop a note into the church letter box and we will include it in the list.



As a church, we have just had our October meeting where we looked at the money side of things. For many years, we have taken the view that it is right to give away at least 10% of the gross income we receive to Christian groups who are trying to help others, many in the third world. This principle is described in the Bible as tithing and this year we donated about £4,000 to such causes. About once a quarter, we invite representatives from one of these groups to update us on their work and, in this way, we are able to pray with them to support them further.

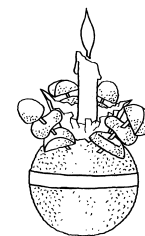
If you are new to the village, we welcome you and please feel free to drop into any of the events and activities we run. More information is available on the church web site and there are brochures available at the church.

Eastington Playgroup

We have started the autumn term and the children have settled into playgroup routines and getting to know each other very quickly. Children have been quick to choose activities, join in with key person group time, and enjoy food tasting at snack time – we have had an Indian feast to learn about Diwali. We have also been talking about special moments and in particular celebrating birthdays and also making Special Books with family photos for the children to look at and talk about.

We have been looking at traditional nursery rhymes which seem to have been somewhat forgotten in this modern time – the children have enjoyed decorating eggs with Humpty Dumpty faces, making clocks for Hickory Dickory Dock and learning about numbers and their order, joining in with rhyming activities. They have also been very busy making up stories with their role play in the hospital that they have made.

On a sad note we are sorry to say goodbye to Claudette Wathern who has worked at Playgroup for over two years. She will be missed and we all wish her well.

GROW your own FRUIT in a COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Adoption by Parish Council

Due to popular demand, Eastington is to have some Community Orchards for volunteers to grow fruit. A bit like allotments, only bigger. Much remains to be done before a spade is dirtied but the Parish Council has adopted the idea in principle and is funding the detailed planning stage.

The Parish Plan Questionnaire (due out before Xmas) will ask questions about Community Orchards, which will firm up support for the principles. It is hoped that the Parish Plan will then contain formal adoption of Community Orchards.

Types of Community Orchard

As a Nation, we have lost 70% of our orchards in my lifetime. We buy our apples at supermarkets, imported from all over the world. Growing Community Orchards is a way of bringing fruit production back into our neighbourhood. Eliminate Food Miles!

We could have several orchards, of different sizes, with alternative purposes, in hamlets and in Alkerton, subject to funds (of course) and the availability of land:

- full production orchards (apples, pears, damsons, plums, berries, currants)
- historic orchards with only Gloucestershire varieties (there are over 100 apple varieties)
- general improvement about the village and contemplative spaces

All these would improve the greenery about the Parish, keeping Eastington rural.

How do you join in?

The next step is to meet all interested volunteers (I have a list of 26 so far) to share opinions and ideas. This will be Thursday, November 25th at 7.30 at the Community Centre (Owen Harris Memorial Ground).

Anyone who is keen to join the movement is welcome, but please leave your secateurs at home at this stage. We will explore the options in which people are most interested and set up working groups to go into each avenue in appropriate detail. Think about your priorities in advance – do you want to help grow historic varieties, or produce good fruit for your family and/or make cider/jam/wine?

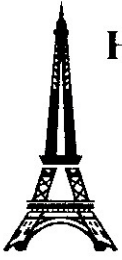

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Compost your waste and watch your garden grow

As part of this year's Waste Reduction Challenge, people across the county are being invited to go green and start home composting. Gloucestershire County Council is running the Waste Reduction Challenge from 20-28 November and people across the county are being asked to sign up to at least one pledge to cut their household waste.

One of the pledges is to start home composting, which reduces what you throw away and produces a quality compost to help your flowers and plants flourish. Uncooked food leftovers – excluding meat and fish – can be composted, along with cardboard, tea bags, old flowers and nettles, bedding from vegetarian pets and lots more. Gloucestershire County Council is offering tips and advice to anyone who is interested in taking up the challenge.

Composting at home benefits the environment, in fact composting for just one year can save as much carbon dioxide produced by your kettle in a year or your washing machine produces in three months.

Cllr Stan Waddington, cabinet member for environment and waste, said: "We all have a duty to do our bit when it comes to the rubbish we produce and that's what the Waste Reduction Challenge is all about. Recycling or reusing as much as you can is a great start, but going one step further and becoming a home composter will really help us reduce what we would otherwise end up sending to landfill. Home composting is easier than you think and there's plenty of support and advice available so why not give it a try for yourself?"

Compostable waste sent to landfill produces methane, which is a harmful greenhouse gas. By composting the waste at home, in the presence of oxygen, no methane is produced. Compost produced at home benefits your garden, adding nutrients, improving soil structure, maintaining moisture levels and keeping your soil's pH balance in check.

Compost bins are available from only £12 by visiting www.recycleforgloucestershire.com and clicking on the composting link. The county council has nearly 20 Master Composter volunteers throughout the County who can provide assistance, email simon.brown@gloucestershire.gov.uk for more details.
