Here in Eastington we really are beginning a democratic process, by asking each one of you about local issues that can have a direct impact on our lives. We don't expect to rock the Global economy, but with your individual views we do expect to influence big organisations that plan changes in our Parish, and to get support and funding for the sort of thing that you want to happen.

<u>Eastington Parish Plan questionnaire:</u> Please set aside some time to complete the questions and have it ready for <u>collection between 27th November and 4th December</u>, when your representative will visit you. If you need to ask about something or to get another questionnaire, then please contact one of the people listed on the front page. The question of 'where to build new houses' is always an emotive topic. Strong lobbying to restrict building in Stroud and surrounding areas, has inevitably led to proposals to build the vast majority of new houses in Cam and / or Eastington – Stonehouse. Cam Parish has conducted its Parish Plan and is preparing its defence, so it is vitally important to get everyone in Eastington to return their completed questionnaires.

Over the past 20 years Eastington has provided about 150 homes for people, and is one reason why our community remains varied and vibrant. This is in stark contrast to some villages where only a few houses have been built. Naturally, the question of how much, what density and what sort of housing you want needs careful consideration. Infilling is building in gardens of existing houses, or demolishing a house to build more, or building on land between existing houses. This can reduce the need to build in open green spaces, but what will be the effects of more cars to park and less space, and less privacy?

Parking at home, at the shops or at school seems also to be a hot topic, so your opinions are also asked about this. Crime and disorder, speeding traffic and road bumps and a wide range of services, are grumbles often heard. So, here is a chance to say whatever you like or dislike and to have your views heard.

If you would like to help processing the valuable data from the Parish Plan questionnaire, please call me. (There will be a paid allowance for this work.)

<u>Broadband questionnaire:</u> Our ever-increasing need to communicate has been extended by 'Broadband' Internet for such things as shopping, banking, watching video on-line or video telephone. But here in Eastington we find that Broadband speed is pretty poor compared with our urban neighbours. For that reason there is an additional questionnaire about your Broadband experience. Under Parish Matters, Cllr. Derek Greenaway explains this is part of central government's initiative to bring high-speed broadband to rural Gloucestershire for the benefit of local homes and businesses.

Back in 'Downton Abbey' days, we may have been reminded that such things as cars, telephones and electrical appliances were luxury items only for the rich. These days we have become dependent on sophisticated technologies for getting about, communicating and generally making our lives more comfortable. For most people living in a rural area like this, it would be difficult to get to work and manage busy lives without a car. Having a host of electrical appliances and readily available gas or oil lets us come home to a warm house after work, store and prepare a wide range of foods and to relax if time permits.

In the 1930's came a huge national investment in the National Grid to bring electricity to the centres of high population. Emotions ran high as armies of metallic aliens marched over tranquil rural countryside, but many were not to get electricity to their homes for some decades to come. Over the past 80 years the vast majority of people have benefited from electricity-on-demand. That compensation and daily familiarity with a forest of poles and pylons carrying the wire life-lines over the fields, has not made them more elegant or attractive, but has certainly sweetened the bitter pill. We have benefitted from investments and sacrifices made in our grandparents' and great grandparents' time, to have electricity on-tap for the gadgets we use today.

There is of course a price to pay for these modern technologies. Not just from your pocket, or the effect on the world's resources, but also on our local area in the form of busy roads and power lines, and a new gas pipeline not far away. To keep up with our increasing appetite for power and desire to get around faster, there are many proposals to upgrade an aging infrastructure. There are no plans yet to replace our local rail link with high-speed rail, but we hear many objections about proposed 'HS2' to give Birmingham fast connections with London and Paris and beyond. New 50m pylons are proposed to increase the capacity of electricity and for getting it around the country; it will be interesting to see the welcome given to these giant newcomers. The new high-pressure gas pipeline with pumping station north of Gloucester has already brought out protesters. Maybe the favoured option will be just to turn down the heating, turn off the lights and get on the bike. Or maybe like the Greeks, we will realise that democracy comes at a price, and making decisions is not that easy after all.

We welcome PC Jo Booker's article and suggestions for improving security. We have an interesting account of Eastington Horse Show held in long-running tradition on a fine August day. For the youngsters, Brownies continue their varied and active programme. Passports and luggage labels were the order of the day for customers checking in at the 'Playgroup Hotel'. For Ladies and Gentlemen aged over 60, Bluebell Club meetings are held at the Village Hall on 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month.

Eastington Community Orchards Group (ECO) combined with Eastington Youth Group to collect apples and pears from gardens and orchards across the Village. Read how to get your hands on some of the delicious juices.

Firstly I would like to welcome Derek Greenaway to the Parish Council. Derek brings a wealth of experience that will help us deal better with an ever increasing quantity of data directed at us and an abundance of planning issues aimed at the Parish.

When some Parish Councillors met to talk about crime in Eastington recently with Inspector Kirk Harrison, it was obvious that quite a lot of useful information is not getting reported to the Police. If they are to help make this Parish safer, then we all need to give them information to help them do their job. If you have concerns about protecting your identity, you can use the crime-stoppers on **0800 555111** in complete confidence. Alternatively you can dial the new non-emergency Police number, **101**.

You may be aware that the Parish Council has supported residents of Swallowcroft in their application to have Sophie's Pitch registered as a Village Green. In these days of high-density urban building and tiny gardens, even small pieces of land can be a significant community asset. Congratulations are due now that Village Green status has been awarded, as this provides legal protection to Sophie's Pitch.

The parish council has received complaints of overgrown hedges making the footpaths and pavements too narrow for safety or comfort. Please take a few minutes to look at the hedges on your boundaries and decide if they need cutting back. Cllr Andrew Cozens has offered a 'special rate' for his boundary hedge cutting service, please contact him on andrew.cozens@farmline.com or by phone 01453 824793 to ask for a quote.

Broadband Speed - Cllr Derek Greenaway

Included in this edition of your Eastington Community News is a separate sheet entitled 'Household Internet and Broadband Survey 2011'. It is part of central government's initiative to bring high-speed broadband to rural Gloucestershire for the benefit of local homes and businesses. In the case of Eastington, the target is to bring the promised high-speed broadband to the parish by 2015. As a newly co-opted member to the parish council, I offered to act as the link person to promote this broadband initiative.

Such connections to homes will be of benefit not just for the low usage demand required for e-mails, but also for school pupils, college and university students studying at home who may be able to access their school/college/university networks for the purposes of study. It will also bring benefit to those who work from home, and for local farms and businesses which have the requirement to upload as well as download information.

In order for this project to succeed, however, it is important for all households and businesses in our Parish to complete and return the survey.

It is of note that there is an existing high-speed internet provision currently available to local rural communities, for example, Arlingham, that I am researching and which may be of benefit to our parish; I will include the details in the next edition of the Eastington Community News.

In the meantime I urge every household to complete the enclosed survey and return it to the address printed on its front page. By doing so, you will be demonstrating a local demand for an essential rural service.

Roads & Transport - Cllr Nigel Souster

When is a pothole not a pothole?

Your Parish Council has been quite concerned about the deteriorating state of the roads in our village. There are an increasing number of potholes along our three main roads, and the surface on some of our residential streets is in poor condition. This being so, in the summer your Parish Council completed a survey of these problems, and submitted a long list of what we considered to be serious defects to Gloucester County Council. GCC control the roads budget, and are the authority responsible for repairing our roads.

Well, it is official. GCC say that we only have one real pothole – in Victoria Drive. All the other many holes in our roads are not classified by GCC as defects requiring repair. To be a 'GCC pothole', the hole must be at least 40mm deep – ouch!

Meanwhile, please monitor the state of the road surface near you, and let your Parish Council – and GCC – know if you have specific concerns. However, we have been informed by GCC that between 13 and 17 February 2012 there will be general road patching in Claypits, between the centre of Eastington and the A38. GCC expect that this will require a closure of the road.

Disabled parking

Your Parish Council has been approached recently to see if a Disabled Parking Bay could be located near our Co-op. GCC, Stroud Council and our Police all have some responsibility for parking matters. A Disabled Parking Bay would have an impact one way or another on the Co-op and many of its customers who stop off by car, as well as all those living or working near the Co-op. And, there are potential problems with land ownership. Your Parish Council is therefore keen to receive as much feedback as possible. Initial views are not to compromise the existing limited parking – and, perhaps, to create an additional space, say immediately to right of the Co-op. Please let the Parish council have your views.

Speeding

One of the long-term objectives of your Parish Council has been to reduce the number of vehicles speeding through our village. An important element of this has been to chase GCC to extend the 30 mph speed limits along our three main roads. Two years ago, GCC extended the 30mph limit part the way down Springhill. There was some disappointment, however, that the extension did not go as far as the dangerous junction near our School and Church. This year the 30 mph has been extended towards Frocester. Your Parish Council continues to chase GCC for extension of the 30mph limits in the direction of Claypits, and further down Springhill towards Chipmans Platt.

District Councillor's Newsletter - Ken Stephens, November 2011

CORE STRATEGY (HOUSES): District Councillors recently toured the district looking at identified sites for potential housing allocations. They were asked to fill in a follow-up questionnaire on the sites and associated items. I did not go on the tour. I have been doing this long enough to know where the sites are. In addition to this the group to which I belong decided not to fill out the questionnaire. The reason we gave to officers for not doing so was 'the Labour Group believes that it is premature at this stage to limit the number of sites in this way; and moreover that it could also be interpreted as supporting a particular policy before Council members have had an opportunity for a debate on the matter'. That was sent on the 14th October. On the 27th October the agenda for the next cabinet was published. This includes at item 10. Core Strategy-Next Steps. It's a very lengthy document and you do wonder how much of it was written before the tour and questionnaire responses. This report recommends a focus of development to satisfy the agreed housing numbers. (Agreed by council, not all members of it)

In this recommendation it is suggested that between 1000 and 1500 homes be built West of Stonehouse. This means **Nupend/Nastend**. The site, put forward in the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment, (SHLAA site 23) stretches from the road into Nupend all the way to the railway line in Stonehouse to the east and down to the A419 south of Nastend. Almost but not quite encircling Nastend. The report also suggests that between two and three thousand jobs will be needed to go with these houses. The site is described in the report as, 'Essentially one large site in single ownership: a relatively straightforward prospect in terms of taking it forward'. The report does not recommend major growth in Eastington village or a number of other named places. The possible double whammy to the Parish, at this stage, seems to be not being pursued.

Readers will be well aware that I have for a long time been very cynical over the way in which this very important matter has evolved over the last couple of years. Some of the things I get to see and hear make this inevitable. Hearing a possible major site allocation described as being at the lower end of the market by someone involved in the process is an example. (This site is not recommended for allocation). It is up to residents to decide if they think the political group that runs the council has brought forward a plan for the development of the district as a whole, or just a number of building sites - the size of which will please carpet building developers. The logic of building around Nupend/Nastend defeats me. The site is not connected to anywhere. Major, very major, infrastructure would be needed to get any easy connection to Stonehouse Town centre, thus enabling the town to fully benefit from both domestic and employment buildings.

Another question: where will the access roads go? How many leading to the A419? I cannot see it being less than two. The only reason for building here has to be motorway access. (commuting?) Something I noticed in the responses by those members who filled in the questionnaire mentioned above possibly says it all. On comments on the site West of Stonehouse, one member at least put, 'Potential for highly sustainable new town'. It has long been thought by many people in our parish that if such a development is started on the proposed site, there will be no way of keeping it constrained. If the report is passed to the next full Council on 24th November and is accepted, a process of public consultation will begin. It will run until January 2012. I hope my position on these matters is well understood and does not need repeating.

SIZE OF COUNCIL: I have been told that there is an initiative being promoted to reduce the number of councillors that make up the council. The figure mentioned to me was a reduction from 51 to about 30. Around 40%. The main reason given was to reduce the cost of running the council. Reducing the council in this way would incur significant cost to rate payers. If the real reason is to reduce the cost of councillors the quickest, simplest way to do that would be to reduce the member's allowances by 40%. I think this would bring them close to what the payments would have been if only inflation had been added over the last ten years or so. I do wonder that if council was reduced in the way suggested, how long it would be before a review board would be recommending that the remaining councillors be paid more than the present allowance. (40%more?) If you reduce the number of councillors you increase the number of people they represent. How local would your councillor be then? My opinion is that if you are going to spend a lot of money fiddling about like this, do the job properly. Get rid of all the District Council's in Gloucestershire and the County Council and have two unitary authorities. A cynical person might suggest that the initiative has more to do with somebody worried about a possible loss of council majority than saving money.

FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR - TONY BLACKBURN

Good news re Sophie's Pitch, half Good News as to Eastington's Roads:

Since I last wrote in Eastington Community News the case brought by Swallowcroft residents and the Parish Council for getting the area of grass at the rear of 9 Bath Road declared a "Village Green" has at last, after nearly four years, been considered by the Commons and Rights of Way Committee of Gloucestershire County Council and has SUCCEEDED! Local residents can, therefore, continue to use the area for leisure activities. ("Sophie", who must be grown up now, is the young girl who used to play football there and lent her name to the case) This just shows that it is sometimes worthwhile pursuing suchlike claims even though it has been an uphill struggle. Congratulations to all concerned. It is unfortunate that the local builders can not use this land as part of their housing development but the remainder of "their site" can be used and sometimes the community should take priority.

As to Eastington's roads, there is less good news but the Parish Council has been active in recording potholes in our area and has submitted details to GCC Highways. So far no action even though the GCC received £3.6 m extra money from the Government for repairs. Highways are, however, offering to enter into a "Big Community Offer" with parishes for such things as snow clearance, weed removal and, I hope, traffic signs and speed limit reductions! The parish has to put in forms and pay something towards the service. The website www.gloucestershire,gov.uk/highwaysyourway has details. I hope to work with the Parish Council in taking up this offer on our pressing matters of too high speed limits on Springhill and Bath/Alkerton Roads to Claypits. The pedestrian crossing I have asked for at Orchard Leigh, Bath Road, is going to be "assessed" in 2012. I hope that there are no accidents meanwhile.

With regard to planning and the threat of development which might spoil Eastington's rural character, I am following the Localism Bill enthusiastically and I am sure that the Parish will expand its excellent Parish Plan to cover the circumstances which will apply when the new legislation takes effect. With the support of Cllr Ken Stephens and Stroud DC, we can resist pressure for unsuitable urban sprawl.

I am pleased to say that Tina Smith and her friends have set up an Eastington Youth Group which is going to operate locally. Anyone interested please contact her at tsmith@sanctusltd.co.uk. They need a storage pod for equipment and other furniture. Can anyone help? Good luck to them and the Group.

The Boundary Commission that decides which parish votes in what area is proposing to move Eastington from "North Stroud" to "Stonehouse" in 2013. I don't know what I (or the other parties,) shall be doing about the new arrangements yet but I assure you that I intend to give all in Eastington full value for money and representation to the best of my ability on The County Council until the arrangements change!

Police Update



Firstly can I introduce you to the new national non emergency telephone number for the police of **101**. This replaces our former 0845 number, and in this county will connect you to our call centre at Waterwells.

Now the clocks have gone back, may I remind you about some simple crime prevention steps for the darker afternoons and evenings? Burglars are unlikely to break into a home that is occupied, or appears to be occupied, so we can give the impression that someone is in even when there isn't. For

example, by fitting a lamp and a radio to timer switches can enable them to come on in your absence. There is also a device available which mimics the flicker of a TV screen (but uses a fraction of the electricity), which when concealed behind a closed curtain gives the impression that someone is home. These steps, in addition to ensuring you properly use window locks, door locks and security lighting around the home, will improve your security and safety through the winter months.

Recently in Eastington, we have enjoyed a relatively quiet period, but the crime that has occurred is being dealt with positively, with suspects currently on bail and enquiries ongoing. Complaints regarding antisocial behaviour are being addressed, and where action can be taken it will be, along with working with the families involved to try to resolve any problems.

Big Apple Day in Eastington

Eastington Community Orchards Group (ECO) combined with the Youth Group to collect and process over ONE TONNE of apples and pears from 20 gardens and orchards across the village. All these apples, in previous years, would have been dumped in compost or just rotted away, so the 500 bottles of juice produced are a harvest made possible by operating on a Community scale.



Some of the dozens of boxes of fruit collected by the Youth Group can be seen behind the Big Press (manufactured by Oak Frame Carpentry).

ECO Group members washed, chopped, pressed, pasteurized and bottled for eight solid hours to produce 300 bottles of long-life juice, which will be sold to pay for trees in Churchend Orchard.

Fortunately, we had a sunny day for our first Apple Day (which occurs on or near 21st October every year). It made for warm work for the 25 Youth Group volunteers in the orchards, so sharing out some of the crop as fresh juice was very welcome.

We are also indebted to **William Morris House** for the loan of their Scratter (for chopping the apples) and for teaching us the techniques involved in pasteurizing.

Eastington Cricket Club Match Reports

Woodchester (185-9) vs Eastington (138-4) – Abandoned Saturday 7 May 2011 (Stratford Court)

After losing the toss and being asked to bowl first Eastington got off to a very good start with Simon Wright taking a wicket in the first over and then Woodchester struggled to get going until the middle overs. 4 wickets from Roger Beese slowed the hosts down but they did get a defendable total of 185-9.

In reply, Eastington headed to be having an early finish and not through rain as 4 wickets went down quickly, however a quick fire 27 from Rob Lange and then unbeaten scores of 75 from Nick Reynolds and 26 from Roger Beese made it look like the visitors would chase down the total until the rain came down leaving frustratingly needing just 48 from 15 overs.

Eastington (77-3) vs Frocester VI (74ao) – Eastington won by 7 wickets Saturday 14 May 2011 (OHMG)

Unable to win the toss Eastington were put in the field again but didn't hesitate in taking some early wickets not letting Frocester get any sort of a start, Roger Beese bowled an excellent spell taking 5 wickets for just 20 runs but was well supported by Sam Jones and Paul Hancock limiting the visitors to 74 all out.

After the interval Eastington got off to a shaky start and were just 15-3 after some good opening spells from the Frocester opening bowlers; however a brisk knock from Paul Hancock helped the home side cruise to victory with an unbeaten 39.

Leonard Stanley (157ao) vs Eastington (97ao) – Leonard Stanley won by 60 runs Saturday 21 May 2011 (Leonard Stanley Playing Fields)

Leonard Stanley won the toss and decided to bat first, they got off to a very good start scoring quickly and wouldn't allow Eastington's bowlers to settle. Eastington then fought back though with some good bowling all round with all their bowlers contributing a few wickets each pegging the home side to 157-7.

The score looked achievable however a constant fall of wickets throughout the innings left Eastington struggling to build a partnership. Only Simon Wright top scoring with 21 and Paul Hancock having to retire hurt on 20 were able to make contributions with the bat, meaning they only reached 97 before being all out.

Eastington (121ao) vs Slimbridge II (122-2) – Slimbridge II won by 8 wickets Saturday 28 May 2011 (OHMG)

For the first time this season Eastington were asked to bat first, however still unable to win a toss! They were looking in good shape at 70 without loss with Steve Gallagher scoring 28 and Paul Hancock 47 however once the openers were gone Eastington collapsed from 90-1 to 121 all out.

In reply Slimbridge didn't look in any trouble, Eastington's Paul Hancock taking the only two wickets of the innings. Slimbridge got home comfortably in just 24 overs making the most of the home side only having 9 men on the field.

Cam III (90ao) vs Eastington (152-5) – Eastington won by 62 runs Saturday 4 June 2011 (Stinchcombe)

Eastington got off to a steady start on what was a very unpredictable wicket; Steve Gallagher hit 51 supported by 27 from Alan Shackell and 22 from Roger Beese. It did look like their total wasn't going to be enough after a Cam hat trick but some valuable late runs from Andy Howarth (25 not out) got ECC to a good total.

Cam III in reply didn't ever get going thanks to some excellent bowling from Paul Hancock who took 6 wickets just 32 and Roger Beese 3 wickets including a virtually impossible caught and bowled! Cam were finally all out after just 28 overs.

Eastington (125ao) vs Painswick III (153ao) – Painswick won by 28 runs Saturday 11 June 2011 (OHMG)

After winning the toss and bowling first ECC got off to a good start with two early wickets, however Painswick's middle order steadied things down. Some good bowling from Duncan Wright 4-31 supported by 3 wickets each from Roger Beese and Paul Hancock then finished Painswick's innings early.

Painswick's total didn't look too far out of reach; however some excellent bowling from Painswick's openers meant wickets kept falling despite 26 from opener Nick Reynolds. A late flurry of runs from Simon Wright (27no) and Martin Wear gave ECC a chance but they ended just 28 runs short.

Randwick (162-4) vs Eastington (139-9) – Randwick won by 23 runs Saturday 18 June 2011 (Randwick Playing Field)

Some heavy rain just before play was due to start meant the overs had to be reduced to 35 per side. Randwick batted well on a very slow wicket with all their top 5 making contributions. Neil Cambell was the pick of Eastington's bowlers returning figures of 3-37 from his 8 overs.

In reply Eastington's openers started well with Alan Shackell scoring 35; however it wasn't easy batting conditions with another rain break during the innings. Eastington's middle order batsmen Paul Hancock (44) and Duncan Wright (19no) looked close to getting home but could only get within 23 runs.

Eastington (73ao) vs Charfield II (170-8) – Charfield won by 97 runs Saturday 25 June 2011 (OHMG)

ECC won the toss and decided to bowl, a decision they may have started to regret as Charfield opener Mark Thomas compiled 76 of the visitors total, despite being dropped twice early on in his innings. Some good bowling from Roger Beese who had 5-45 wasn't enough as the damage had already been done.

In their innings, Eastington didn't ever get going after losing early wickets. The only batsmen to reach double figures were Andy Howarth (25) and Sam Jones (14). ECC only managed to survive to 30 overs before all being dismissed for just 73.

Saturday 2 July 2011 (Stratford Court) - Match cancelled due to Eastington being unable to raise a full team.

Frocester V vs Eastington – Match Cancelled

Saturday 11 July 2011 (Marling School) - Rain resulted in this match being cancelled on Saturday morning.

Eastington (91ao) vs Leonard Stanley (143ao) – Leonard Stanley won by 52 runs Saturday 16 July 2011 (OHMG)

Another rainy couple of days almost got the better of this game, however the pitch was just about fit for purpose at the start. Leonard Stanley were put into bat and batted aggressively in the opening 7 overs, however some consistent bowling from Richard Wall (5-26) and Paul Hancock (4-22) saw the visitors all out in just 33 overs.

Eastington's innings didn't get off to a good start with the top four all failing to get into double figures, only Roger Beese (26) showed any resistance for ECC as they crumbled to just 91 all out from 30 overs.

Slimbridge II (132ao) vs Eastington (165-5) – Eastington won by 33 runs Saturday 23 July 2011 (Slimbridge Playing Field)

Another stuttery start for ECC after being put into bat, and the runs didn't come easy as Eastington were just 50-2 from the first 20 overs. However the patience paid off as Steve Gallagher reached 36 and some latter innings hard hitting from Paul Hancock (63) saw ECC to a good score on what was a lifeless pitch.

Eastington's bowlers put the pressure on from the start with economical spells from the three main bowlers. A late middle order surge from Slimbridge almost upset things but Duncan Wright (3-37) and Paul Hancock (3-31) saw them all out just inside the 40 overs.

Dear Friends,

Christmas seems a long way off at time of writing, and I guess for many of us it will be a more difficult one financially than the last. With rising inflation, limited or no increase in pay or pensions, or without a job and with limited state support life can seem incredibly bleak, and the endless advertising for expensive Christmas gifts that seem beyond our reach just seems to rub salt into the wounds.

I'd like to turn your attention to one of the most endearing of Charles Dickens' characters, who generally makes an appearence on television over the Christmas period too, but often gets overlooked due to the main character in the story of 'A Christmas Carol'. The main character is of course Ebeneezer Scrooge, but the endearing character is Bob Cratchitt, his hard-up clerk, who is expected to work in freezing conditions and on Christmas Day.

Despite having a large family, including an invalid son, and a wife who has no time for Scrooge because of the way he treats her husband, Bob refuses to wallow in self pity, nor does he stoop to blaming his employer for his meanness of spirit and lack of generosity as regards his working conditions and pay. Instead he appears thankful for what he has, and finds value in things that have no price, and indeed cannot be bought – particularly the family he has, and the love he shows to and receives from them.

I often wonder if St. Joseph's attitude was a bit like that of Bob Crachitt? He just seemed to take whatever life threw at him, and cope with it. His fiancee fell pregnant, the baby wasn't his, so he didn't want to make a fuss about it. An angel told him that the baby was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, so he carried on with the marriage preparations after all. Then Quirinius ordered a census to be taken, so he packed a close-to-giving-birth Mary onto the back of a donkey and set off for Bethlehem. When he got there he couldn't find anywhere to stay that would have been decent for her. He didn't give up though — he accepted a stable offered by one innkeeper, which was better than nothing. Then he became her birthing partner to the Son of God. Even now a husband doing this for his wife tends to make the news! Then he had to cope with visiting shepherds and wise men, register for the census (the bible doesn't mention this, but I suppose he did do it) and, after all this, take all three plus the donkey into exile in Egypt after being warned by another angel that Herod was out to kill the child he'd gone through all of this for. Quite remarkable when you stop and think about it.

If you think that just coping with life isn't achieving something, then think again. Both Bob and Joseph are, in my opinion, the unsung heroes of the original and true Christmas Story, and of the best of all the subsequent stories written about Christmas. They are steadfast in supporting their families, and are ultimately both rewarded according their circumstances. May God bless us similarly – every one!



The canal project has been making great strides in the Stonehouse to Brimscombe Phase 1A length under the leadership of the SDC Canal Team. The new bridge in Stroud is finished thus removing one of the big blockages to restoration, Ryeford Double Lock now has its gates installed, Upper Mills Bridge is finished and dredging has taken place on the long pound between Stonehouse and Ryeford. The Trust is participating in the project in all sorts of ways including the design and fabrication of heritage style lock paddle gearing.

Other works are just starting which will see the canal fully restored between the railway crossing at the Ocean and Lodgemore Lane near Stroud (about half of the Phase 1A length). There is now an imperative to get this work done as a major festival, Stroud on Water, is going to take place next to the canal at Marling School at the beginning of June next year for 3 days. This incorporates the IWA National Trail Boat Festival (which will attract lots of visiting boats), the 40th anniversary of the start of the campaign to restore the Cotswold Canals and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations. Part of the function of this event is to support the campaign for the restoration of the rest of the canal and particularly the Phase 1B length which passes through Eastington.

On that front, there has been significant progress and the intention is for a bid to be submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a new grant of somewhere in the region of £10 -12 million this month. Stroud District Council have agreed to be the lead partner for this bid and funding has been found to support the work needed for the initial bid and, if this is successful, the development stage that will follow. Due to the current financial constraints imposed on all Local Authorities, it has to be assumed that SDC will not be able to contribute significantly towards the £4 million or so of matched funding that will be needed. This requirement for matched funding will be perhaps the biggest challenge but some of this can be in the form of work in kind.

In order to help keep the overall costs down and to make a major contribution to the work in kind, the Trust is intending to take on the restoration of the "missing mile" which starts at the bottom of the Eastington Flight of locks and runs all the way to the A38. The new channel under the M5 would be constructed by contractors as it is assumed that the Highways Agency might be resistant to CCT volunteers digging around under the motorway. That still leaves us with about a mile of new channel to dig, two brand new locks to construct and the restoration of the buried Westfield Lock which was blown up by the M5 contractors. This is all a huge job and we will need all the help we can get.

It is also hoped that all sorts of bolt-ons can be added to the project although these need to be fundable and negotiated with adjacent landowners. For example, there are long-standing aspirations to create an enhanced wetland environment in the base of the Frome Valley and there may well be opportunities for Community Orchard projects.

Assuming the bid does go in as planned this month, HLF will make a decision in April. If positive, the development stage will probably take 1 - 2 years and will involved extensive consultations with all interested parties including the local communities through which the canal passes. This time, the intention is to take the project right up to the planning permission stage so that work would be able to start shortly thereafter.

How long will it take to complete Phase 1B? To some extent, that will depend on the availability of matched funding. If that is tight, more will need to be done by volunteers and that will take longer than if contractors were doing more of the work. With a reasonable tail wind, about 5 years may well be possible.

Eastington Slimming World Group

Autumn has arrived so our thoughts in group have turned towards foods that are warm, comforting and really fill you up on the cold dark days ahead!!!!! So we have put our heads together and come up with some wonderful meal ideas. Some of these I have included below.

- 1. Chilli and rice: Fry off a large chopped onion and 2 cloves of garlic in fry light. Add a pack of extra lean minced beef and brown off with the onion and garlic. Add chilli powder and fresh chopped chillies to suit your taste and any herbs you like. Add 1 carton of passata. Give a good stir and then add one pack of mushrooms sliced, one red, one yellow and green pepper sliced, one tin of red kidney beans (drained first) Leave to simmer so it reduces and thickens and for the flavours to merge together. Add salt and pepper to taste and serve with fresh cooked rice of your choice.
- 2. **Vegetable soup**: Chop one large onion and soften in a non stick pan. Add one peeled diced potato, 2 sliced leeks, 2 peeled and diced carrots, 2 sliced sticks of celery, one head of broccoli cut into florets. Cover with water. Add 2 stock cubes, salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until the vegetables are soft and blend with a hand blender or food processor.
- 3. Slimming World Cooked Breakfast: Grill 2 rashers of bacon with all fat removed. Cook 2 eggs in fry light, grill off mushrooms and tomatoes. Serve and enjoy.
- 4. **Fish Pie**: Dry fry a chopped onion, chop up into bite sizes 2 large fillets of fish of your choice, slice 2 hard boiled eggs, add a carton of passata, a few capers salt and pepper. Top with mashed potato and bake in a medium oven for an hour. Serve with vegetables of your choice.


