It was with sadness therefore that we learned of her recent death following a long illness. She had taken great interest in our Village since moving away to Selsey in West Sussex, and her welcomed phone calls to many of us were a chance to exchange interesting news. Many people in the Village have said they would like to have a service to remember Shirley and an opportunity to give thanks for the big contribution that she made to Eastington. Early in the New Year a memorial service will be arranged to celebrate the life of Shirley, so look out for the notices, and if you would like to take part please contact me on the number below.

It would save Planners a lot of work if most of the new homes needed for the District were bundled as a 'blob' rather than distributed around the area that they serve. But that reason does not make it a good idea. The news on this front makes for depressing reading without a glimmer of festive cheer. This topic dominates articles from *Parish and District Councils* who also bring news of Boundary Changes, Sheltered Housing and other issues important to Eastington. A couple of members from Eastington Flood Group recently spent time further up the Stroud valleys with like-minded local groups to se how best to reduce risk of flash flooding to we 'valley dwellers'. In the article 'Stroud Valleys Rural Sustainable Drainage System Project', you can read how slowing down the flow of water from the hills in times of torrential rain can help reduce flooding risk to those who live close to the flood plain.

The College of William Morris House gives an insight of their community and introduces a proposal for new workshops to enhance development of vocational skills. Eastington Community Orchard Group's 'Apple Day' was a remarkable success, and a record amount of produce has been prepared this year. For the best way to get hold of these scrumptious juices and gift packs see inside for details.

If it's activity you are looking for you may find articles about the *new 'footpaths' group (PROWD)*, or the '*Jolly Joggers' group* to be the ticket. If you are a bit busy in the lead up to Christmas, how about another look following the festivities? It could just be the answer for a New Year's resolution when the time comes. If all that activity seems too much, then an armchair update from *Alkerton Rangers* might whet your appetite for some live spectator sport at OHMG.

Few can have missed the remarkable recent achievement in restoration of the Stroudwater Canal between Stonehouse and Stroud. Now we can see progress as the section between Stonehouse and Saul Junction (Section 1B) comes into the limelight. Your ideas for creative opportunities or volunteering to help would be most welcome as the multi-million pound Heritage Lottery Fund bid is compiled, as explained in *Val Kirby's article*.

The Council is still very busy, with planning still very high on our priority list. SDC (Stroud District Council) will decide next month on the number of houses they want to build in the district over the next 20 years. If this number is around 11,000 we can expect the West of Stonehouse (WoS) application to be strongly considered. The Council supports the work the action groups are involved in and I hope parishioners will do likewise so we can try to prevent our lovely vibrant Parish becoming a "concrete jungle".

At the Council meeting on 11th November the Council agreed to support a group of Parishioners who want to set up a P.R.O.W. (public rights of way), or better known to some of us as footpaths group, to protect our much loved and valued walks in our Parish.

It is good to see the new playground being well used and now the fencing is finished it is looking good. There are plans in place for more equipment and landscaping to be done, and thanks for all this work must go to a small group of people who have organised it and made it happen. District Councillor's Newsletter

Local Plan

The meeting to decide what the District Council's response to the EIP Inspectors initial findings are will take place on the 9th December. This will probably happen before some people read this article. My personal opinion on how things are turning out on this is that I fear that things have moved into another phase recently and that the outcome of this meeting will not be to the benefit of the Parish's of Eastington and Standish. There is not much else I can say on this just now. I will have more to say in my next newsletter after the meeting. Work is continuing within the Parish to show to officers and other councilors what are believed to be fundamental errors in the reports and decision recommendations that will be tabled at the meeting. This will continue right up to and in the meeting itself.

Boundary Commission Review

The District Council's all party working group have submitted a recommendation to the Commission on how they think the District's Ward boundaries should look, taking into account the changes required to accommodate a more equitable and acceptable resident-councilor ratio. The recommendation includes a new ward that will comprise the Parish's on Eastington, Standish and Whitminster. This will be a single member ward. I was not a member of this working group.

Sheltered Housing Service.

The new service arrangements for tenants in the District's sheltered housing schemes starts on Monday 24th November. I hope these arrangements provide everything it is hoped they will provide. The tenants in these schemes really do need a long period of stability and calm after what seems to have been endless years of restructuring and upset.

Public Rights of Way

PROWD (Public Rights of Way Defenders) - New Action Group

Following on from the last Eastington Parish Council meeting on November 11th, I am pleased to let you know that a new group has been formed to give our PROW's a higher profile and to encourage more people to use them, also, to ask regular users and dog walkers to report any problems that they come across.

The core of the group will be Councillor Jennie Corrie, Sally Mears, Ann Pitcher and myself. We will meet every quarter to discuss PROW issues. Once a venue has been found, the date and time will be circulated so that anyone may attend. Please log your email address with me in order to receive this information and up-dates on any activities. We would hope to organise some walks around the Parish, some footpath clearing and maintenance,

and possibly have some map reading sessions.

I cannot stress enough that the Public Rights Of Way, are <u>your</u> Public Rights Of Way, and they need to be defended.

We know that Amey (the County Councils PROW Contractor) had some 'bedding in 'problems in April, and that their sub-contractors were not in place to do the usual footpath clearance, but, despite having fewer staff, the PROW team in Shire Hall continue to do their best to maintain and improve our PROWs.

I have been very impressed and encouraged by the large number of Parishioners who have supported the protection of local footpaths including the Ramblers, our M.P. Mr Carmichael, and people from other Parishes.

Sustainability

Stroud Valley RSuDS (Rural Sustainable Drainage Systems) Project

Two of us joined Chris Uttley, RSuDS Project Officer for SDC, as he took a group of local people to the top of the Slad Valley to see the innovative work being undertaken to eventually prevent torrential flooding along the Slad & Painswick watercourse. Everyone is living in an area where flooding has happened in recent times, some of them with considerable damage to their properties. We, in Eastington, are of course downstream from that part of the Frome & therefore need to take note!

It wasn't raining on that morning but, as we all know, it had been pretty heavy in previous days so we needed waterproofs, wellies and walking poles to wend our way across & through woods & mud.



Chris was introducing us to the facts about the potential risks of 'Boscastle-like' flooding within one or two of the Stroud Valleys unless sufficient work is carried in the next few years to set up systems that can alleviate these risks.

We were shown how the techniques that have been considered, and are being installed, include permanent/semi-permanent designs that will collect, store & treat water resulting in a slower release into the environment. Designs tend to have a low cost, low energy input with low maintenance costs & result in positive impacts on the environment.

They are typically located in three main areas depending on their design: in-channel, across flood plains & land areas or across farmyard areas.

We were looking at one method of 'in-channel' system to develop

barriers with woody debris which result in reducing the speed of water flow & the collection of water into small pools upstream of the barrier.

The photos show how large logs are used to make these barriers – they are strategically placed, drilled & fixed in place with metal poles at least 6ft in length hammered through the wood & down into the ground.

The continuing support for this work from the County Council is vital to prove its viability and to provide alleviation in the sensitive rapid reaction catchments of the Frome catchment.

What's happening William Morris House College?

We realise that despite being part of Eastington since the `70s we are very little know by the local residents. We wish to redress this, so let me introduce who and what we are.

William Morris House College is a residential and day provision Specialist College for young people with special educational needs, catering for young people from Gloucestershire as well as students from other cities and counties across the UK. We are a part of the International Camphill Movement, which was founded in 1941 in Scotland. We value an education which uses meaningful work especially in hand crafts such as weaving, felting, wood work, and candle making, as well as working to care for the land and grow our own flowers and produce. We then use this in our food processing to make jams, preserves and juices. Through rhythmic work in the houses, preparing food, cleaning and doing the laundry, students also learn valuable independence and self-help skills. The mornings are taken up with more formal class

based study and activity and two mornings are devoted to movement and drama. Many go out on work experience and to leisure activities in the local community. We promote students preparation for life in the modern world, but value the use of awareness, of the course, and of the year and the seasons, through the celebration of festivals, some of which are being lost in the modern materialistic society.

We employ more than 60 people, and also have volunteer workers staying with us to help, usually for one year, who come from many parts of Europe and the World.

Realising we have a very low local profile, we made a start to change this some two or so years back by helping the local apple growers (Community Orchards) to make juice using our Food Processing Workshop Facilities. This has been very successful and helps to keep a contact with the people of Eastington. We have also always been good customers of local shops and especially the butcher.

What's new?

All special colleges are undergoing a difficult time at the moment due to the austerity cuts and new funding regulations. However, we are optimistic that we will overcome this. One very new and important development is the construction, now very far advanced, of a



new workshop complex on land we acquired 4 years ago, situated behind our existing site. This will give us not only state of the art facilities for 3 workshops but also a café and kitchen/food processing facility. We hope to use the facility, which will be set in landscaped grounds, will not only be for college use, but in a flexible and open way will attract all walks of life to learn craft skills, develop vocational skills and enjoy café facilities close to attractive canal walks. We hope to keep our local community informed through regular contributions to the Eastington Community News.

Community Group - 'Don't Strangle Stroud'

Where are we now?

On December 9th 2014 SDC will vote on the number of houses they believe are needed between now and 2031. The Office of National Statistics suggests that the population in our district will grow from 114,000 today to 126,500 by 2031, around 11%. In response to this population growth the council commissioned a consultancy report that has, remarkably, arrived at a figure for housing growth of 11,200 or around a 22% increase in housing stock for an 11% increase in population.

Needless to say the report contains a number of very basic errors that inflate the housing requirement by about 900 houses. As the ECN goes to print we are challenging these with the evidence to support the challenges. If the council decline to accept the arithmetic mistakes these will then be presented to the Inspector in January.

Politics

It appears to us that both the Labour and Conservative groups and the smaller parties, will unite to vote this higher number through. West of Stonehouse (WoS) will probably be included. Ken, David Drew and Tom Williams have worked tirelessly to prevent this happening. We believe our task has been made much harder because there are indications that the SDC political Labour Leadership is considering abandoning Eastington and Stonehouse. That they are likely to be joined by the Conservatives is indeed very unfortunate. Calculating the future housing requirement is quite difficult and requires a keen interest in demography and also skills in using the DCLG and ONS website spreadsheets. In addition you need to understand how these calculations are made. It is probable that very few councillors understand this and are therefore relying on the consultancy report and officers advice. As the consultant's report will be guided by his commission it will say what his paymasters want it to say, and of course it does.

The Arithmetic

To justify West of Stonehouse the figure has to be in excess of 11,000. Around 10,500 would rule this out. If the errors were corrected then the figure would be around 10,500 hence correcting the errors are likely to be resisted. The "errors" are very basic and it is surprising that an "expert" in his field, the consultant, should make such basic mistakes. It is true however that to get beyond 10,500 any consultant would need to be very creative.

The Inspector

Obviously the Inspector at the reconvened EIP will consider carefully the evidence we submit but the pressure to build anything everywhere is very great. The Inspector requires an "objective assessment" of housing need. He will not accept "errors" where they are proven to be errors.

Does the Council decision enable SDC to resist planning applications?

The answer is almost certainly not. 11,200 houses require 450 houses to be built every year until 2031. The average over the last 20 years has been around 380. SDC have to have enough land allocated and developers must be able and willing to build 2,250 houses in the next 5-year period. If this cannot be done, and invariably the developers argue that it cannot, then an Inspector at appeal will consider that SDC does not have a 5-year land supply. Over the last few years one planning appeal after another has been lost, as SDC has conceded that it does not have a 5-year land supply. The higher the housing number agreed the more difficult it becomes to achieve the 5-year land supply. SDC have chosen a very high number because of this decision. Nowhere is now safe.

West of Stonehouse

Of course many will believe that the WoS development will protect the rest of the District and the rest of the Parish. Sadly this will not be the case.

Strategic Site

If WoS is approved the 'strategic site' between Stonehouse and the motorway will just go on and be developed further. The private land available for such development is 500 acres plus 1,000 acres of council land. Yes, the first phase is 1,350. This plan will rise to at least 2,000 within the first year on sustainability grounds with the prospect of some of the allocation to other areas being transferred to WoS this was proposed by Council Officers in the Planning Advisory Panel (PAP) in March 2013. There is already keen preapplication interest in a retail park; a football stadium and distribution warehousing near the motorway junction. Such a development will lead to a plethora of planning applications for the parish.

Next Steps

We are very grateful for the incredibly generous donations that we have received which has made it possible to employ a Barrister. We still need your help for the next phase.

Stonehouse, Eastington, and the Stanleys have come together under the Acronym of SPA (Strategy Planning Association). They are together offering funds to continue to support a planning consultant and Barrister for the reconvened EIP. This team will represent all our communities. We have a strong case. The maths is wrong, but changing the numbers, will be resisted at SDC by those who have been pressing for the WoS development for many years. With the right legal support and a coherent case we can still prevail and avoid the fate of becoming a Kingsway or even a Bradley Stoke.

Beekeepers Diary Part 5

October 14th. The hives are full of stores and the weather remains beautiful. I popped round to remove an empty box and tidy things up a bit, when I discovered a sizable cluster of bees hanging in a clump under their hive. It is so lovely and warm that all three colonies were flying, so I left them to their own devices hoping they would put themselves away in the evening. I checked on them as the evening chill set in and was puzzled to find the cluster was still hanging around outside. A few puffs of smoke dispersed them, so I imagined they would crawl back indoors.

October 15th. They are there again so Nick smoked them away and blocked off the underneath of the hive with a board. However they found a way round it and several handfuls of bees were still there. This is very curious and I haven't a clue what's going on, so I did a Google search which wasn't really helpful.

October 17th. The weather is still gorgeous, so I opened up that hive. I couldn't understand what I found. There is a whole comb of unhatched drone brood and no new worker brood. Has the queen become a drone layer, which can happen when they run out of fertile eggs? I didn't see the queen. Has she gone under the hive for some reason and some workers gone with her? There wasn't any space for her to lay eggs, so I put an empty frame into the middle of the brood area for her to use. I scooped up the bees from under the hive in a mug and threw them back into the top of the hive, checking that there wasn't a queen left clinging to the underside of the floor. Then I emailed the Stroud beekeepers, hoping for enlightenment. The reply was curt and suggested bad beekeeping on my behalf, but I'm pleased to say that the

next day I received an apology. The apiary manager had looked into one of his hives and found a similar situation there. We concluded it must be something to do with the freakily hot autumn weather, coupled with the amazing honey flow from the ivy and late garden flowers. Perhaps the bees have been seduced into thinking it is spring and are making drones in preparation to swarm again.

After I scooped up all the bees and returned them to the hive, the temperature dropped considerably for the night and bees haven't overflowed under the hive again. I don't know what has happened to all those drones that were developing. I gave one more varroa treatment to each colony, as drone brood creates a good environment for the mites to breed in. Now the bees are all shut up again and will just have to take their chances through the winter.

If you are thinking of planting a bee garden for next year, here are a few suggestions for common garden plants which are popular with bees: cotoneaster, buddlea, mahonia, pussy willow, lavender, rosemary, sage, hebes, cosmos daisies, michaelmas daisies, sedum (ice plant), snowdrops, catmint, campanula, cranesbill geranium, dandelions.

If you are a keen gardener you can go to Google where you will find an excellent list of plants listed by season. You need to type in 'gardening for bees uk'. Then go to the British Bee Keepers Association article where you will find several pages of plants amongst which are some exciting suggestions.

On November 11th the Parish Council voted to become a Partner in Phase 1B - more details of opportunities and benefits in the February 2015 ECN


Val Kirby, chair of Phase 1B working group

The delay is a huge benefit: it allows us to plan in more detail, involve more people in our thinking and planning, and build up wide-ranging support from partners, volunteers and local communities (ed: that includes Eastington)

On the technical side: plans for restoring and recreating the canal, its locks, bridges, landing stages and so on are making good progress. We are also working on:




