The footpaths group, 'PROWD', have an update in this issue, and it's good to hear about an amicable solution for some footpath diversions.

The start of a year can mean New Year resolutions for some, and it's not too late to try something new. Maybe Jolly Joggers have something to suit you or perhaps 'Street Dancing' could be for you? "Defined Dance" is starting new dance classes for adults and children at Eastington Community Centre.

The Examination in Public (EIP) of the Local (Stroud) Plan has now been extended from two days to four. It would be speculative (at the time of writing) to read this as creating time to make the Plan 'sound' or to give all interested parties adequate talking time. By the time you read this we should have the benefit of 20:20 hindsight. Local planning groups give further perspective to these matters, as does our District Councillor, Ken Stephens, who additionally considers the Boundary Commission Review and recent intervention of the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, Eric Pickles, to allow the Javelin Park Incinerator.

Playgroup learnt about Chinese New Year and Chinese food, but traditional stories like 'the three billy goats gruff' and 'Goldilocks' also retain their interest. An alternative oriental cuisine can be savoured at Eastington School on 27th February when they hold their School Quiz and Thai food evening.

We read from the Rector about his preparation for retirement; and news of events and services at St. Michael's. There something new at the Methodists Church in the form of 'cafe style' services, and more messy events like Messy Easter; and cakes too. And in the report from Owen Harris Memorial Ground Charity, (OHMGC) there is an invitation for new trustees and announcement of their Annual General Meeting to be held this summer.

Millend Mill renovations are at an advanced stage and nearing completion. Steve Mills gives us a very interesting insight into the newly installed water wheel. It's good to have a 'good news' story about a development. With the guidance of a truly community formulated Neighbourhood Development Plan, maybe we can look forward to more developments that fit well with Eastington in the future. May 2015 be a good year for you.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS NEWSLETTER

Local Plan

I expect you will all no doubt be aware of what happened at the Council meeting in December. It was not the best day of my life. You may be aware from the tenure of my last newsletter that I was not surprised at what happened. One of the things that I am the most disappointed about is what did not happen from July to December last year. I had hoped that the Planning liaison structure that was created at the beginning of this civic year would have had more impact and input into what went on in meeting the EIP inspector's new data requirements than it did. In fact in my opinion it had no influence at all in what was tabled at the December meeting. Much work is being done to continue the defence of our rural parish for the resumption of the EIP scheduled for the 29th-30th of January. My opinion is that very few of the people who voted for the creation of a new settlement actually understood the full ramifications to the district of the decision and what exactly the position would be after the decision.

Boundary Commission Review

I made reference to this in my last newsletter. I said that amongst the recommendations I had been led to believe the District Council was making to the commission would be a new ward consisting of the Parishes of Eastington, Standish and Whitminster. On looking at the small print I find that this is not a totally true picture. Unless I am reading the plans wrong, the proposed ward will not include all of the residents of those parishes. Everything to the west of the motor way in Eastington would be in the Severn Ward. Newtown would be in Stonehouse ward. Parts of Standish Parish around Little Haresfield would be in the ward to the north and a part of Whitminster Parish would also be in a ward to its north.

All this is driven by numbers only and the system seems to care little for community links. The three parishes involved would be in wards with a total of at least seven, perhaps eight, separate district councillors and two possibly three county councillors. The phrase absolute nonsense springs to my mind. There will be a period of public consultation in the coming months for residents to give their opinion on these proposals.

Javelin Park Incinerator

Another disaster for the vale, in my opinion, with the decision of the secretary of State to allow the planning consent on appeal. What ever happens now a large sum of public money will be spent on a proposal for a project that will destroy the vale with something that the vast majority of the local community does not want or need and is not the best way of treating our long term waste needs.

How many of the supporters of this monstrosity actually live within sight or sound of it? Very few if any I think. A mile or so to the north a lot of time, money, and energy was spent making sure that the new motor way service area was basically buried and the visual impact on the vale as minimal as possible.

You do wonder what was the point of all that with this decision.

Happy New Year everyone - if it's not too late. I hope you all had a good festive break. The Eastington Parish Council has been very busy since the beginning of the New Year. Some of the councillors and parishioners have been working with our planning consultant as he prepares our opposition to the Bath Road appeal against the refusal of Bathhurst's planning application; preparation for the restart of the Examination in Public (EIP) of Stroud District Councils (SDC) Local Plan [29th& 30th January] has also been a high priority.

Eastington Parish Council has joined with Stonehouse Town Council and Standish Parish Council to form 'Stroud Planning Alliance' (SPA); this helps with additional resource and finance. If you would like to know more about this group please get in touch, or better still come to Parish Council meetings the second Tuesday in every month. Details can be found on our web site or on the notice board outside the Co-op.

We are setting our budget for 2015/16. This is a challenge as we are still fighting planning applications in the Parish. We also want to set up a Parish office in the Community Centre (OHMG) to enable us to have a safe storage for our records, and an appropriate work place for our Clerk. Parishioners will be able to visit the Parish Office by appointment. If I can be of help please contact me.

Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

Thank you for your responses to the survey, they have been analysed and now the Plan is near completion, with the policies currently being written.

Discussions are on-going with Stroud District Council on Eastington's NDP and how it complies with Stroud District Council's Local Plan, planning legislation and guidelines. Unfortunately Stroud District Council's Full Council meeting on 9th December 2014 suddenly agreed to include the proposed West of Stonehouse site for development in the Parish of Eastington. This may cause a delay in the production of Eastington's NDP as this now has to be included as a consideration in the plan.

The Steering Group is also watching with interest the progress of the Local Plan at the Examination in Public (EIP) on 29th and 30th January 2015, and the resulting judgement of the Inspector as this will have a very significant impact on Eastington's NDP. A case of watch this space!

Examination in Public Of the Local Plan Reconvenes

On the 29th and 30 of January The EIP adjourned last April gets back to work. The Inspector "now wishes to resume Stage 1 of the examination in order to review and assess the work undertaken by the Council before deciding whether to proceed to stage 2".

A NEWLY FORMED ACTION GROUP

DSS, KER and Eastington Parish Council have joined forces with Stonehouse Town Council, Standish Parish Council under the banner of the Strategic Planning Alliance (SPA)

How many houses do we need?

SDC commissioned, after the Inspectors Initial Conclusions in June last year, a second Objectively Assessed Housing Need (OAHN). SDC believed that the first OAHN did not state enough houses in the plan. This new OAHN prepared by a second management Consultant, Neil MacDonald (NMcD), raises the number of houses required in the planning period (2006 - 2031) from the previous OAHN. The number has risen from 9, 500 to 11,200. To understand the scale of building Stonehouse has about 3500 homes. It would appear that an OAHN can realise any answer the SDC wishes.

SDC plans for more commuters

To achieve this remarkable change between 2 OAHNs, NMcD has had to employ much imagination and invention and very limited amounts of evidence. In addition he has introduced a new policy for SDC to provide an additional 800 houses for commuters, which very conveniently matches the reintroduction of the WoS site which in the last consultation was to provide houses for local jobs.

The Law and the Evidence

We have received definitive advice from 2 barristers that there are a number of significant breeches in the Consultative process required of SDC. These opinions have been ignored by SDC.

We provided irrefutable evidence from the Office of National Statistics (ONS) that NMcD's creative approach to inflating the housing need was simply wrong. SDC's response was to state that NMcD "believes" he is right. It appears that it is for the Inspector to determine whether "Beliefs" or evidence prevails.

SDC Planning for an urban Sprawl

There is no doubt that SDC have our parish in their sights. Plans are being developed for a Retail Park and a football Stadium between the "Starbucks" roundabout and the Motorway on the right hand side of the A 419.

A new site was introduced in the December 9th Council meeting of "M5 Catchment North of Eastington for 700 houses" (not pursued at this stage) this in addition to the Bath Road plans. It seems inevitable should we lose the WoS battle Eastington and Stonehouse, will, over the next 20 years become a large urban sprawl.

What will be the Outcome

On the 29th January the SPA team will include a Barrister, Planning Consultant and Statistician. We believe we have a good chance of coming out of this round with a positive outcome for our communities. Equally there are those in SDC who believe that as long as the NUMBER is big enough the Inspector will just accept it with the evidence base just taking a back seat. We will know the answer to that in February. What is certain is that there will be another round of consultation on whatever changes survive the Inspector. For that we will need all the help we can get. Please let us know if you are prepared to support this fight for the future of our Parish.

Our playgroup offers care and education for all children from 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years to 5 years in a well-established community based group



Café Church

In December we tried something new for us – a Sunday church service in the style of a café. This has been tried by other churches to good effect but we had not done it ourselves. We have run messy events and drop in café sessions at the church, both of which include drinks and an excellent range of cakes so there was plenty of experience on those aspects.

The December Café Church did attract people who would not normally come and the feedback was very positive. Encouraged by requests to do it again, the decision has been made to run a series of these on the first Sundays of the month at 11am. These are all age events and suitable for young families, children and teenagers as well as adults. People sit round tables, just like a café, rather than in rows of chairs all pointing forwards.

Last year, we ran a few themed youth sleepovers at the church that started on a Saturday and concluded after the Sunday morning service with the young people usually taking part in the latter. There have been requests to run more of these too.

We therefore intend to run a youth sleepover in preparation for, and leading into, the Café Church sessions – at least for some of them (some of us have not



really come to terms with the prospect of running a youth sleepover every month!!). Therefore, the plan for the Café Church on Sunday 1st February is that it will be preceded by a youth sleepover starting at 2pm on Saturday 31st January. The young people involved will put together a puppet show about one of Jesus' parables with training by Graham Miles our minister (who owns the puppets) and the result will then form a part of the Café Church session. All jolly good stuff so why not come along to this or one of the subsequent ones? – you will be very welcome.

Normality resumes on the other Sunday mornings with a crèche for younger children. The services over the next few weeks will be looking at some of the parables that Jesus taught to the crowds and then explained to His disciples.

John West, one of our regular leaders at the Friday Youth Club, retired as a leader at the end of the year after many years helping us out. Youth Clubs up and down the country rely very heavily on people like John to be able to run at all and we will miss him. We are very fortunate in that Aeron, one of our older young people, has developed a real interest in helping out with youth club. He is going on a training day in January and considering pursuing further education in youth work.

Owen Harris Memorial Ground Charity report


The essential work of the small management and trustee committee continues to maintain and improve facilities for users of the community centre and sports field.

Remembering Ron Bomberg...

In 1947, despite the ten-foot snow, Ron was playing cricket in the back streets of the East End of London. He said they played on bomb sites and unexploded bombs were lying hidden in the outfield! A good preparation for some rural Gloucestershire pitches! He moved to Sussex, played cricket at Bowley, and taught at a special school for maladjusted children called Farney Close where, as Chair of the Governors, he developed links with local clubs to reintegrate boys into society. He has since visited the school almost annually, amongst other things, to check the state of the cricket square!

Ron found his way to Gloucestershire and started playing for Eastington in 1967. He played in the Holloway Cup winning side in 1970; became captain and led the side to the Stroud League title in1972. Ron was an accurate, economical, medium paced bowler who could pin batsmen down, especially on damp pitches. His batting consisted mainly of stonewall defensive blocks punctuated with exhilarating drives; very useful attributes for a lower order batsman. He once used both for some considerable time when he and I, as the last pair, took Eastington to victory at local rivals Frocester. He reminded me of that match every time we met on that ground for years and years afterwards.

There wasn't much that could stop Ron playing cricket but one event at Stonehouse certainly did. Ron, having said that he needed the loo, had left us fielding with 10 men. Some considerable time passed before another fielder was sent to see if he was ok. Eventually, after some delay, both returned. Ron had been unable to escape from a cracked plastic toilet seat that clamped his skin every time he sought to rise; pain only subsiding when he sat down again. Eventually, and with some difficulty, using his spinning finger to good effect, Ron unscrewed the nuts that held the seat to the pan so he, seat still attached, could escape and prise open the crack.

Ron was one of the club's main fundraisers, selling lottery tickets for many years to anyone who couldn't run fast enough. With the rest of the committee and some of the players he hand built a cricket pavilion (still standing) at Stratford Court, Stroud where Eastington were playing at the time. The Owen Harris Memorial Ground Charity (OHMGC) was formed to run and develop the community facility and Ron became a member (and later Chairman) of the charity, and the cricket club's representative. Now an impressive solar powered community hall has changing and kitchen facilities.

Ron had always been a knowledgeable cricketer, of both tactics and laws. If you wanted to know what the umpire's decision should be for an obscure or unusual event, then Ron was the man to ask! A car accident towards the end of the century led Ron to reduce his playing so he took an umpiring course. Umpiring in the Stroud, County and West of England leagues he was twice voted GACUS umpire of the year. Back problems in his late 60's meant retirement, but he became one of the first boundary umpire assessors, a job that he did until very recently.

Ron married the daughter of an Eastington player and his influence naturally led to his wife and daughter doing the teas and scoring; his sons, daughter and grandson playing for the club. In 2012, despite the back problem, his 73 years, 45 of them as an Eastington CC member, he was still no stranger to doing work on the square. We nominated him for a Gloucestershire Cricket Board/ NatWest OSCA, that's an outstanding service to cricket award. This was duly awarded, at Lords, in October 2012 in recognition of a lifetime of achievement in cricket. The awards celebrate the volunteers who work tirelessly to ensure the success and survival of the grass roots game, their selflessness and dedication, and the huge amount of time they give up for the good of others...Without people like Ron, cricket and cricket clubs simply would not survive.

Tuck into this healthy-version of an all American classic. In this recipe lean pork is slow-cooked then shredded or 'pulled' and layered with a bbq sauce.

BBQ Pulled Pork in the slow cooker

Ingredients

1.5-2kg pork shoulder, all fat removed 5 tbsp Worcestershire sauce 1 tsp mustard powder 500g passata 3 tbsp balsamic vinegar 2 cloves of garlic, crushed 3 tbsp sweetener Salt and freshly ground black pepper Method

- In a small bowl, mix passata, Worcestershire sauce, balsamic vinegar, mustard powder, garlic, sweetener and seasoning. Transfer to a small pan and simmer for 15 minutes, or until the sauce thickens.
- Meanwhile, trim and remove all visible fat from the pork and sear all sides in a hot frying pan. Transfer to a slow cooker coat with the sauce and cook for 8-12 hours on MEDIUM.
- Remove the pork from the slow cooker and place on a cutting board. Allow the meat to cool for approximately 15 minutes, then shred into bite-sized pieces using two forks.

Chicken tikka masala with coriander rice

Winter nights were made for this rich, smooth curry with just the right kick.

Ingredients

Salt and freshly ground black pepper
4 skinless chicken breasts, cut into small chunks
250g dried basmati rice
A large handful of fresh coriander, finely chopped
600g green beans, halved
2 tsp black mustard seeds
200g fat-free natural fromage frais
Lime wedges, to serve
For the marinade

250g fat-free natural yogurt Juice of 1 lime 1 tbsp tandoori spice blend

2 cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and finely grated

3 garlic cloves, finely chopped



- Put the marinade ingredients in a large glass bowl, season with salt and stir. Add the chicken and mix to coat evenly. Cover and leave to marinate in the fridge for 4-6 hours, or overnight if time allows.
- About 40 minutes before you want to eat, put the rice in a pan with 650 ml water and bring to the boil. Season well and stir in half the chopped coriander. Cover tightly, reduce the heat to low and simmer for 10-12 minutes. Remove from the heat and leave to stand undisturbed for 10-15 minutes.



Low calorie cooking spray 1 garlic clove, finely chopped 1 red chilli, deseeded and finely chopped 1 tbsp tandoori spice blend 500g passata with onions and garlic

- Meanwhile make the sauce. Spray a large, heavy-based frying pan with low calorie cooking spray and cook the garlic, chilli and tandoori spices over a medium heat for 30-40 seconds. Stir in the passata and tomato purée, reduce the heat to low and simmer for 20-25 minutes or until the sauce has thickened.
- Preheat your grill to high. Thread the chicken onto metal skewers and grill for 5 minutes on each side, or until cooked through. Discard the marinade.
- Meanwhile boil the beans for 2-4 minutes. Drain well. Place a frying pan sprayed with low calorie cooking spray over a high heat, add the mustard seeds and beans and stir-fry for 2-3 minutes or until fragrant. Season well.
- Remove the cooked chicken pieces from the skewers and add to the sauce.
 Simmer for 6-8 minutes, then remove from the heat and stir in the fromage frais.
 Garnish the chicken tikka masala and rice with the remaining coriander, and serve with the beans and the lime wedges for squeezing over.

Millend Mill gets a new water wheel

Over the course of a week during last October, something quite remarkable happened in Eastington. For the first time in nearly a century, a water wheel driven by the River Frome began turning in one of our two remaining mills (Millend).

We've talked about this mill in the past but to recap briefly, it was built around 1815 to produce woollen cloth and was later converted successively to a maltings, corn mill, saw mill, and finally used for the storage of antiques. The past few years have seen an extensive programme of rebuilding of the main mill and its conversion into apartments.

The ground floor has become a large open entrance area. As part of this, two of the remaining wheel pits that formerly housed the three large 15 ft diameter water wheels that originally provided power for the mill, were opened up. It's now possible to see the river flowing under the mill through their outlet tunnels. This now makes an interesting feature and focal point for the lobby area. To further enhance this, one of the pits has now been fitted with a new water wheel. This has been made largely of wood and was designed and constructed by David Empringham Woodworking of High Wycombe. The company has worked on a number of important heritage projects around the country that have included both traditional water mills and windmills. Recent projects have included a windmill in Oxfordshire and a watermill in Worcestershire. Closer to home, between 2002 and 2009, they also restored Stanway watermill near Winchcombe. This now produces flour using locally grown grain. Their work gained an award from the CPRE (Campaign for the Protection of Rural England), citing the comprehensive, meticulous restoration.

At Millend Mill, the company manufactured a complete set of parts that included a pattern for the hubs, a machined steel shaft with shell bearings, and oak rims and spokes, paddles, etc. for the wheel. The individual components were made off site, with the wheel being assembled piece-by-piece within the existing wheel pit. The mill's



original wheels were very wide, so the pit was narrowed in order to accommodate its more modest replacement. The entrance to the pit was dammed off during the assembly process and a new steel grill located at the pit's inlet so as to protect the wheel from any debris floating downstream.

The assembly process went like clockwork, and the entire wheel was put together over the course of less than a week. At the moment, it's purely ornamental. However, it's hoped that at some point in the future, it can be coupled up to power an electrical generator. This will produce pollution-free electricity from what is at the moment, a



largely wasted resource.
Although there are currently a few small such hydroelectric projects operating within the Stroud valleys, it would be good to see another one working, this time within the village.

Nearing completion, with the first paddles being fitted

The company redeveloping the mill should be commended for the current project. There has been no requirement for them to fund and install a water wheel – it has simply been

a desire to create something special in what is already an elegant building with a long interesting history. Similarly, they have been careful to retain various other features that reflect the mill's lengthy working life. Its conversion and reuse for apartments is ushering in a new chapter - it's going to be a great asset for Eastington.

Beekeeper's Diary

Winter is a time of rest for the beekeeper, also for the bees. However they do not hibernate. Staying alive through the winter is a cooperative act. The queen must be kept alive at all costs, although she will probably be off lay through the coldest spells.

The workers form a large cluster round her on the nearest honeycombs, pointing their heads inwards and their tails outwards and vibrate their bodies to generate heat. Thousands of bee bodies shivering raises the temperature to around 33 degrees centigrade in the centre of the cluster. This is warm enough for the bees in the middle to consume the honey in the combs they are huddling on.

Life isn't so cosy for the bees on the outside of the cluster though (only about 10 degrees) so the outside bees have to work their way back into the middle to warm up and feed leaving some of their sisters take a turn at shielding the colony from the cold. Whole colonies can starve, even with honey stores close by, if it is too cold to cross the gap. Fortunately I have never witnessed that first hand.

January 11th

On warm days bees can break cluster and move across a gap to fresh combs still full of stores. They can also utilise such days to throw out any corpses and to fly out just far enough to void themselves.

Today is lovely so I strolled round to see what was happening and to make sure the strong winds hadn't blown anything over. All the hives were intact. The mouse guards are still in place. There were no heaps of dead bees outside the entrances.

One thing caused me to raise an eyebrow though. The wood on my brand new hive looked saturated and I wondered if it was wet through to the inside, so I lifted the roof. It was dry. A couple of bees buzzed me and I could see them all jostling about under the feed hole.

One hive had six bees crawling across the entrance and two dead bees had just been jettisoned. I lifted the third roof just far enough to see it was busy round the feed hole. This all looks good.

The pallets that they stand on are really rickety, slippery and dangerous to move around on. We really must do something about it.....some other day.

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
