

Ecotricity - The New Stadium Proposal



Following discussions with Stroud District Planners, Ecotricity have been advised that their original proposal would not fly and so have amended their planning application.

It retains the original planning reference S.16/0043/OUT

The planning application no longer includes any employment/business park and the proposed Nature Conservation Area to the west of the M5 has been removed.

The 'Sports Complex' has been reduced in scale and repositioned to the north of the A419 as shown

Consequently, this outline application is now 'just' for a replacement 5,000 capacity stadium for Forest Green Rovers Football Club (FGRFC) Including a Club Shop, food and beverage

facilities, a health and fitness suite all purely for FGRFC as well as training /conference rooms and office space for FGRFC staff.

The proposal also includes two full size grass training pitches, a goal practice area, parking for around 1,740 cars, and parking for coaches and bicycles. A parkland setting is envisaged with the planting of some additional 500 trees and 1.8km of new hedgerows. In addition full planning permission is being sought for traffic light controlled access off the A419, including a pedestrian crossing, and a foot/cycleway along the south side of the A419 with some reinstatement of the hedges and lay-bys.

It should be noted that some of this work will be provided under the Gloucestershire Growth Deal, wherein the Government has already agreed to invest £4.4m by 2021 via GFirst LEP for junction improvements and carriageway widening within the A419. This was meant to provide necessary improvements to the road before any effects of the stadium were considered.

It should also be noted that all pretence of a 'public amenity' for sporting activity has been dropped, and the whole project is **entirely** for the benefit of Forest Green Rovers.

The upside of this is that activity should be limited to Saturday afternoons and the occasional Tuesday evening. The Downside is that it will sit empty, as a white elephant, for the rest of the time — until FGR decide to make some cash by renting it out for goodness-only-knows-what purposes when they run out of money.


From our point of view the new proposal is an improvement (for the moment!) on the old. The business park was really the greater threat in terms of traffic and general nuisance. However, it would be naive to believe that this threat has gone away!

The main problem is that when the revision of the Local Plan coming along (effective 2023), these sites — both North and South of the A419 — may well be included as possible 'strategic' development sites. If this occurs, it will make it much harder to argue against any development on them. It is hard to understand how a football stadium of such limited appeal might in any way be considered a 'strategic' development, but we seem to have to demonstrate this. In any case, the revised Local Plan cannot come into force before 2023, so any planning permission that allows work to commence before this is still contravening the Local Plan as it stands.

Everyone opposed to this new application should make a FRESH objection on the Stroud planning website (same ref no S.16/0043/OUT) or, if you are experiencing problems with the website (and it has been 'difficult' lately) you may email the planners directly at david.lowin@stroud.govuk - or write to The Planning Office at Ebley Mill, Stroud.

Planning

West of Stonehouse development



The building of the new 'spine' road continues apace, to the point where it is already hard to remember exactly what Grove Lane looked like before they started.

As reported last time, the Planning Application for the first phase originally submitted by Redrow, was rejected mainly for non-compliance with provisions in the Masterplan for buffer zones around Westend and Nupend.

This problem has been 'shelved' by both the builders and the planners for the moment as Redrow have now submitted plans for just the two land parcels that don't have direct 'sensitive' borders with Westend – leaving it to another builder, Barratts, to argue about the buffer zones(!) The original owner of the whole site and authors of the Masterplan (Hitchens) are nowhere to be seen in all this.

The Redrow application will probably be passed, although there are still some contentious arguments on-going about the bridleway and it's crossing of the new road. Redrow seem disinclined to take this very real problem seriously.

Two discussions have taken place with Barratts and suggestions made about re-arranging the housing just a little

in order to give our hamlets the breathing space promised in the Masterplan/Local plan. However, Barratts seem disinclined to move very much from the original designs, which build right up to people's back gardens, and we shall have to wait for the Planning Application itself to see what we can do next.

If builders were just a little more sensitive to the needs and sensitivities of 'indiginous' populations – not to say a little more careful about following the guidelines and provisions that they are supposed to - they would get much less opposition in general. !



PARISH MATTERS

Here we are at the start of another year, hope you all had a good Christmas and New Year.

Planning continues to be the main area of work for the parish council, five applications received in the first two weeks of January. The biggest one is the revised Ecotricity plans, application reference S.16/0043/OUT – the revised drawings and files are available on Stroud District Council's planning website, but the files are slow to load. Stroud DC has two paper copies of the files available in their Reception area at Ebley Mill. The stadium has been moved across the A419, and the business park has been dropped from the plans. Please do make your comments

The Parish Council has finalised its budget for 2018/19 and the precept (parish portion of the council tax) will be £70,580 which is a 0.53% increase on average Band D properties. We have several projects we want to achieve in the coming years but didn't want to burden you with a big increase in the precept, so will be "saving up" over 3 years to do things like resurface the burial ground footpath. Please visit our website if you would like to see a breakdown of the budget.

District Councillors' Newsletter

The Great Oldbury development, previously known as **West of Stonehouse**, is continuing apace, with planning applications for Reserved Matters, which include layout, house design, landscaping, and buffer zones have started to arrive on the Planning Officer's desk at Ebley Mill at a faster rate than before. These applications are being submitted by individual building companies, Redrow and Barratts, to whom the plots of land have been sold, while Robert Hitchens still has control over the Masterplan. Please be assured that Cllr Stephen Davies and myself will do all we can to get the best results for Eastington parish residents. At the planning meeting at Ebley Mill earlier in January, we both supported Eastington Parish Council's statement and its comments on the application that was in front of the planning committee that evening, in addition, Cllr Davies asked for broadband cable ducting to be installed in all new roads as they were being built, to prevent them being dug up later, while I asked for the Highways condition on installation of wheel washing facilities on the sites to be extended to include catchment tanks for those washing facilities, to prevent contaminated runoff entering local watercourses.

We understand that the **Ecotricity** proposal to build an "Eco Business Park" adjacent to the northern side of the A419 close to J13 of the M5 has been shelved indefinitely. Instead, it is now proposed to build the new stadium for Forest Green Rovers FC on that site, as close to the M5 slip road as is possible. The area will have one outdoor practice/training pitch, and an area for goalkeeping training to be held. All the car parking will be at the Shell Service station end of the site. These plans are in Outline at the moment, and still have some way to go before any decision is made.

While all drivers are more than fed up with the current phases of **roadworks and traffic lights** in the area, there are Highway plans for works to all the roundabouts between J13 and Horsetrough at Stonehouse to be implemented soon, to "Improve Traffic Flow" on the A419. So the daily commute may not improve in the near future. Lets hope the local by-roads will not have to take the brunt of drivers' frustrations.

The Village Agents scheme has been replaced.

As usual with something new there is a plethora of confusing new names, responsibilities, websites and phone numbers. As far as your editor can work out, this service is still run by Gloucester County (as 'Community Connectors'), but is 'provided' by a company called 'Independence Trust (Herefordshire Housing)' and then known as the Community Wellbeing service -see Below.

Fortunately Pauline Allen has been round these loops a few time trying to find help for someone, and has discovered that you can also call a direct line phone number for **Amanda Baker-Dibley** (Stroud area services) **on 01453 755711** - she is only in on Tuesdays 9-5 but will pick up messages at other times and is keen to help.

Community Wellbeing Service

Here is an update from Penny French, our old Village Agent, on what has taken the place of the Village Agent Scheme:-

Since 1st October the Village and Community Agents have combined with the GP Social Prescribing scheme to become a new service called Community Wellbeing Agents and many of the Village Agents have been transferred to the new scheme.

Independence Trust is one of a number of Community Wellbeing providers in Gloucestershire who have been commissioned to offer the service in Stroud and Berkeley Vale.

Who can access the service and what can it offer?

The service is free and confidential for anyone over the age of 16 and its aim is to connect you to local services, organisations and groups that can help you to improve your general wellbeing and meet your wider social needs. Community Wellbeing Agents will help you with:-

- Mental health and wellbeing
- Long term health conditions
- General health and fitness
- Social isolation, housing and environment
- Debt and finance

How do I refer?

Referrals can be made directly using the number below and can also be made by GPs, health care professionals, voluntary and community groups as well as self-referral.

The service is open from Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm and the phone number is 0345 863 8323.





Chairman's and Treasurer's Reports for 2016/17

Chairman Tom Morrison and Treasurer Lynne Farnden provided detailed reports of the first year's activities. The Chairman's conclusion was

"ECLT Limited has had a very active and successful first year as a registered Community Benefit Society. Feasibility of our site and ideas has been proven, a dozen technical reports are ready on the shelf and positive relations established and sustained with Stroud DC, Parish Council and our Housing Association partners, Aster Group.

At the next AGM we should not only be reporting a successful Planning Application but seeing affordable homes rising from the fields of Claypits, and perhaps even some of those occupied."





Progress has only been possible through the acquisition of several grants amounting to almost £75,000, detailed by the Treasurer's report:

- Locality (Government) grant of £9,750 received and spent
- Further Locality Grant of £20,000 received with a commitment to £20,000 more (received in January 2018)
- Parish Council Solar Fund Grant of £4,000 released
- Stroud DC contractually committed to additional funding up to £20,000, of which £7,300 already received in the new financial year

ECLT's turnover for the year was £28,971, which is likely to be surpassed in 2017/18 as we work our way through the planning process. A full Annual Report will be published in the Spring.

February sees a Café Church closely followed by the Messy Half Term event a few days later; the theme for the 11th March Café Church will be "What does it mean to follow Jesus". One of the things that this means is trusting in God's love and provision for us.

As some of you know, our family got an unexpected surprise in October when my wife, Beck, went into to A&E in Gloucester with sudden chest pains and came out the following day with a diagnosis of cancer. At first, it was thought to be lung cancer quite possibly of a dangerous type that could have meant that Christmas 2017 may well have been her last.

Three biopsies later and further tests eventually determined that it is a somewhat less dangerous lymphoma, possibly of a fairly unusual type that has manifested itself, at least in part, as quite a large tumour.

Anyway, another scan just after Christmas showed that it was growing at quite a rate so she was immediately put on chemotherapy and last Friday morning her hair started to fall out and what little remained by the end of the day was shaved off as it just looked scruffy. She is now part way through six cycles of Chemotherapy which will be a big part of her life until the end of April and possibly into May.

Because the chemotherapy badly messes up the immune system, Beck has had to step back from many of the activities that heavily relied upon her input.

So where is God in all this? Well she is not feeling too bad in spite of the treatment and has been able to spend more time praying, reading, thinking and doing other stuff that previously she would not have had time to do. Knowing that people she knows and some she doesn't, some from all over the world, are praying for her is a great encouragement. Others have stepped in to help fill the gaps caused by her absence.

The point is that we all have a choice of facing our challenges alone or with God alongside us – we have opted for the latter and in doing so are finding blessings in the face of adversity.

Environment

Cotswold Canal Trust

On the 30th November last year, a bid was submitted to the Heritage Lottery fund for £9.8 million towards restoring the canal between Stonehouse and Saul Junction. The project known as Stroudwater Navigation Connected, will cost a total of £23.4 million, including volunteer input.


The bid, led by Stroud District Council, runs to roughly 1000 pages and is the culmination of several months' work by a team of largely Cotswold Canals Trust volunteers. Credit must especially go to Val Kirby for doing the lion's share.

A previous bid, submitted by the Cotswold Canals Trust in 2015, was rejected, citing a lack of funding commitments and uncertainties over land ownership.

Prospects for the latest bid have been transformed by Stroud District Council committing £3 million, together with large contributions from Gloucestershire County Council and the Canal and River Trust.

The bid includes proposals for taking the canal under the M5, reinstating the 'missing mile' near Eastington and getting under the Gloucester to Bristol railway line at Stonehouse Ocean. As well as restoring the canal, plans include creating over 30 hectares of priority habitats in one of UK's largest biodiversity offsetting projects.

The outcome should be known in April 2018.

There is also a national organisation called the Waterway Recovery Group (WRG) which will back up and assist local groups on restoration projects.




