

PARISH MATTERS

In the last edition of the ECN we reported that the **Memorial Garden** had been completed; however Council felt that the work looked unfinished so we have arranged for the contractor to return and finish the stone circle in the same stone finish as the pathway. We are also planning what to plant in the garden around the stone circle.

Lorry Watch update: A big thank you to our volunteers who took their places on 20th August to check for lorries that may be breaching the 7.5t weight limit. There were 2 observation sessions, one in the morning and one in the early evening. Three lorries were identified that may have been over the limit; the companies were contacted and confirmed the lorries were over the weight limit but were not delivering to the village. All three companies will remind their drivers not to breach the weight limit in the village. There is a copy of the full report given to Council within the September meeting pack on our website, or please contact the Parish Clerk if you would like to receive an emailed copy.

The Parish Council has approved some funds to have the full width of pavements reclaimed from encroaching **verges on Spring Hill and Bath Road**. We are working with Gloucestershire Highways to get this work done ASAP.

We have some ground works to do at **Snakey Park** to repair the ground around the more popular play items; it is good to see so many families enjoying the park. The mechanism on the aerial runway is wearing out so the parts will be replaced at the end of September.

Would you like to be a parish councillor (or district councillor)?

There will be elections in May 2020, and Eastington Parish Council will have 11 seats to fill. (This is an increase of 2 councillors owing to the rising population at Great Oldbury)

Stroud District Councillors' Newsletter

The Council has been coming back to life after the holiday period, meetings have been taking place, however the next full Council meeting is not until 17th October.

Interviews for three new Strategic Directors, to form a Management Team with the Chief Executive, Kathy O'Leary, will be taking place in early October, current members of staff have been able to apply for these positions, as well as applicants from outside the Authority.

The **Forest Green Rovers Stadium** re-submitted planning application. The earliest this is likely to go to the Development Control Committee is believed to be December. Highways have changed their minds on parking issues, and are likely to ask for controls on roads around the proposed site on match days.

There will be 2 new electric cars delivered to the **Neighbourhood Warden Service** in September, they will be white Nissan Leaf models, with the SDC logo on the front doors. This is the start of replacing the entire fleet of old and costly vehicles currently in use by the Service.

The plans for revamping the **Broadfield Sheltered Housing** site should be available to view online at the end of September. (**See below)

Works to construct the **Canal through Whitminster Roundabout** are due to start in October. This will involve, at times, contra-flow traffic management around the roadworks there. Human nature being what it is, drivers heading for Stroud from the A38, or indeed the M5 junction, and vice versa, may be looking for alternative access roads, such as through Eastington. The work is scheduled to last until September next year.

** Broadfield Road is a sheltered housing scheme owned by SDC. On part of the site there is an existing detached building which provides communal facilities for the site, including a former Scheme Manager's accommodation. The communal facilities are under-utilised and the scheme manager's accommodation is no longer required and has been empty for some time. It has been proposed to demolish the communal building and replace it with new affordable Independent Living bungalows specifically for older people. Existing tenants will receive some compensations for loss of facilities and are generally in favour - a final consultation will be undertaken with tenants prior to planning submission. Ed.

History

A fishy trans-Atlantic connection

We all know who Billy Connolly is and I'm sure many of us are watching his latest 3-part series on ITV of his travels round America – 'Billy Connolly's Great American Trail'. The latest episode saw him in the fishing port of Gloucester, Massachusetts, where some of the discussion centred on the history of the town's fishing industry. Apparently it was not uncommon for Gloucester fishermen to sail to the north in search of cod, and one of the prime locations was in the seas off the coast of Newfoundland in Canada.

All very interesting, but what's it got to do with Eastington? Remarkably, one of our local landmarks played a very important but completely overlooked role in the Newfoundland fishing industry. The landmark in



question was Fromebridge Mill, now well known to all of us as an inn and restaurant.

The mill has had a remarkably long and varied career stretching back to Domesday, when a small corn mill was recorded on the site. Over the centuries, it was rebuilt and converted to other uses on countless occasions.

At different times it was used for woollen cloth manufacture, as a malt mill, and for producing animal feedstuffs. However, the most interesting period in its history was when it was the home of the *Fromebridge Company*, set up in 1759 for the production of iron, copper and brass wire.

The Company also went on to manufacture pig and bar iron and became of national importance. For example, they were granted a number of patents for manufacturing stronger ships bolts and developing improvements in the process of iron founding.

When it came to wire, they became so important that when it was ordered from other manufacturers, it was often specified that it should be made to the 'Fromebridge Standard'.

In 1779, it was recorded that Fromebridge Mill was......

.....one of the most complete works in the country for making iron and steel wire.

And where was one of the biggest markets for the wire they produced? It was used to produce countless fish hooks destined for the Newfoundland fisheries

- so there's our link!







Newfoundland fishermen. It was a hard and dangerous way to make a living. Thousands lost their lives and it was written that "the history of the Gloucester fisheries has been written in tears"

History

This was the time of the German Spring Offensive, in which half a million lives would be lost, towards the end of WW1, before the eventual Allied victory looked remotely likely Other pages mourn and try to make sense of the great losses and sacrifices; this is a glimpse into the frustrations of daily life just trying to carry on.

A meeting was held on Feb. 28th. Present, The Rector, (Chairman), Messrs. E. Hooper, J.P., W. J. Smith, A. W. Keys, A. F. Daniels. Routine business was transacted, and finances examined.

The Trustees met on March 6th., and decided with regard to the usual Exhibitions for scholars.

One Way of Doing Things.

The replies in Parliament are about as misleading as War Communiques. From what one reads of the work done by military authorities, one would think that they were the "best of all authorities." If, however, you examine into their ways a little more closely you will find that the stupidest of business men would not do the absurd things they do. I say nothing of how frequently the same account has been paid over and over again. I say nothing of the scandalous waste of the taxpayers' money on the Frampton-Frocester railway. I say nothing of the crass, rank injustice of taking the little food left for parishioners. But in the name of decency and common intelligence I do protest against the latest folly,—the surreptitious inveigling of local farm and other labourers from their steady and necessary work, by offering them more than twice the wages they had. Have not the authorities had sufficient warning from their stupid efforts in the same direction in the early days of the war? Will they never learn? Or is it that they are too grossly ignorant? If the folly is pursued I hope the farmers and others will "down tools." It really seems the only way to bring such people to their senses. Since writing the above I have been informed that the Quedgeley gentlemen have offered £2, a week to a local man who was well content with his 25s. a week for necessary work in which he has served since his boy-hood. Can no check be put upon such criminal stupidity ?

The Local Pensions Committee.

I am not a "man of affairs," if I was I should soon want to know something of the workings of the Local Pensions Committee, and the ways in which supplementary aid is given to applicants. A case has been referred to me recently from

Cheltenham, and I strongly recommended no aid to be given. Why? Because the applicant was in receipt of a pension for herself and some seven or eight children. To anyone who could not live and pay her baker, rent or other debts on so ample a sum as these numbers obtain, it would be unkindness to put more money in her possession for

Normality.

Most of the soldiers billeted on the parish have been transferred to Frampton, and our village is again resuming its normal life. There are some results from the billeting that many will regret.

Abnormality

Since writing the previous paragraph a new batch of soldiers have been billeted on this parish, and, I regret to say, the parish is once more in a state of commotion and moral turmoil. The scenes on our public roads after dark are not a credit to either the men, the giddy, foolish young girls, or their parents. I sincerely hope that the county police will be vigilant in reporting any licensed house that supplies any man, not in a fit state, whether he be officer, sergeant or private. On Sunday, March 10th, we had some scenes that were not creditable. We have a number of officers here, and I strongly hold that one at least should personally patrol the roads from five to ten o'clock at night. They are not overburdened with military or other work, and they should be taught that soldiering,—whether for officer or private,—is no longer toy-work, but work returned for pay. The social side of soldiering is a thing of the past.

These preparatory works will allow us to ensure that work progresses efficiently with minimal delays. The enabling works at Old Ends Lane will be undertaken as day work and will continue until October. There will be a requirement to undertake some night works .

We know that our wildlife is under increasing pressure from human activity and every wildlife sanctuary, however tiny, is really very precious.

The good news is that the topsoil was replaced when the job was finished and the disturbed area is now re-greening nicely. In the Spring, we will see if the meadow flowers that support many butterflies, insects and other invertebrates re-grow. I'm hoping for, and expecting the best. So thank you, Knights Brown, for caring for our biodiversity hotspot.




Wild Hogs Hedgehog Rescue

Hello from Wild Hogs.

Well by the time you read this we'll be into Autumn and maybe we'll be slightly less busy in the hospital. We've had the busiest summer ever, and by half way through August had treated as many hedgehogs as we did in the whole of 2018. So many of our patients this year have been orphaned or abandoned babies, often three or four in a litter – very time-consuming for our volunteers. We've had good success rates though, and have released many back into their original locality. Yet still they arrive – second litters now – so the hospital is still almost full to capacity. As the Autumn descends upon us, continue with leaving food and water down for the hedgehogs and please don't panic if you see one out and about in the cold weather, its much better to leave them out in the wild rather than them live in rescue, although we are more than happy for you to ring us to check. If we do have consecutive frosts however with the ground being continually hard and you see in particular small hedgehogs then please do give us a call.



We had a wonderfully successful Open Day in August. Strangely we didn't have great expectations as the weather forecast was pretty awful. However, we made arrangements to use the Village Hall rather than only our own driveway, and so many people braved the rain and wind to come and support us. Shortly after 11am when it opened, the hall was packed and people were queuing to get in. Despite the gazebo outside the hospital collapsing in the squally conditions, we calculated that about 250 people took the chance to have a guided tour inside, before returning to the hall for refreshment. As well as a good selection of cakes and the usual tombola and bric-a-brac, we had activities for children and some really lovely craftwork for sale. Many thanks to everyone who came along.

If you would like to be part of the team involved in improving and running the Hall please don't hold back. It's not difficult, and it's satisfying to be part of a team that keeps the hall open for business.


