Eastington Community Land Trust Ltd. (ECLT) Providing the affordable homes that Eastington needs

Building begins at Puddleworth Close, Claypits

After three years of planning (and another five or six in background), at last work has started on our first 23 affordable homes. It has taken 65 ECLT board meetings (we are all volunteers) and £85,000 of grants from various sources to make it this far.

We are now dependent on EG Carter of Gloucester, building to ECLT's designs for our Housing Association Partners, Aster Homes. The bulk of the £4 million project cost comes from Homes England, an agency of the Home Office.

Whilst the scale of the machines being used is impressive, at this early stage it is difficult to make out what the site will eventually become. A lot of this is because the first installations are underground pipes (water supply, storm water drainage and foul drainage), manholes, and telephone and electrical ducting.

It will be around Easter 2020 before the first brick walls sprout up.





The spine road will soon be following - quite vital as a protection to the underground mains (water and fibre cables) that pass under the site to link regional supply networks.

ECN will bring you more exciting photos in the next edition.

Delivery will be around the end of 2020, dependant on the vagiaries of the weather, of course!

All these homes are for affordable rent, to be let by Aster Homes through the Stroud DC waiting list – Homeseeker Plus - but with a preference for people with an Eastington Local Connection.

As many of you may already be aware, our Parish Clerk, Julie Shirley, resigned in October. Memorial Garden

After what could be considered a 'shaky start', the contractors have completed the initial work on the Memorial Garden. Whilst awaiting the next phase of planting in the Spring, Councillors will cover the ground with weed suppressant.

Spring Hill and Bath Road

Following extensive negotiation, Highways have agreed the amount of money they will allocate to improving the pedestrian paths along sections of both Spring Hill and Bath Road. At the last council meeting it was agreed by Council to go ahead as soon as possible.

Snakey Park

Improvements to the Play Park are also imminent, and we are currently waiting for our chosen contractors to begin work. They need to try out a sample of the material they will use to repair areas, and this work is very dependent on weather conditions.

Great Oldbury

Council has had leaflets printed to welcome the new residents and these will have been delivered by the time you read this.


Unfortunately, we have to let visiting batsmen use the screens as well, and seeing the ball is still not a guarantee you will actually hit it, but it helps!

Local Plan Review - Good News & Bad News

Every 6 or 7 years, Stroud DC have to review the Local Plan. It affects Housing and Industrial Land allocation in particular, and the new plan will run from 2022 to 2040

The Good News

No further commercial house building is planned outside of Great Oldbury.

Specifically, no sites are planned for around Alkerton, although all other villages of similar size will have an allocation (e.g. Whitminster, Frampton, Minchinhampton).

Thanks go to the Parish Council for sticking to our Neighbourhood Development Plan and to ECLT for building the homes that *are* required by Housing Needs surveys, ensuring that they are exclusively affordable homes primarily for Eastington-connected people. (see page 2).

The Bad News

Land at Junction 13 has been 'allocated' for a football stadium north of the A 419 and an industrial park south of the A 419. This closely resembles the Ecotricity/Forest Green Rovers recent proposals (but does not give them any 'right' to it). Please see the on-going saga of the football stadium on page 15, which is now urgent.

Allocating industrial land so close to Junction 13 seems a poor strategic idea. It can be described as a "honeypot" site which will attract all the demand for new factories and drain the life out of more dispersed sites at e.g. Oldends Lane, Littlecombe, Cam, Sharpness and the Stroud Valleys.

- Stroud DC own dozens of factories and workshops in all these dispersed locations and will lose considerable income to the "honeypot". How's that for an "own-goal"?
- All workers will have to travel by car what price Stroud Zero-carbon 2030?
- The dispersed industrial sites were properly strategically planned by Stroud DC.

Public Consultation

Stroud DC will conduct a series of open-days in December where you can browse the plans and discuss reasoning with the Planners (send complaints to *local.plan@stroud.gov.uk*). Nearest open days:-

4th December - Stonehouse - The Magpies Pavilion at Oldends Lane (across the railway) 2pm – 6pm 16th December - Slimbridge Village Hall – 2pm – 6.30pm (and 17th December 9.30 – 12.30)

History

Lost cottages

Everything eventually wears out or falls to bits, and houses are no exception. Even when they are meticulously maintained, there comes a time when their upkeep simply becomes too much or they no longer fulfil a need.

But a bit of background to the two cottages pictured here. Well-known postcard collector Howard Beards from Stroud, recently asked if anything was known about them.

The first, I was able to help a little with - this was Vernal Cottage. From what I've been able to discover, it stood in the corner of the field at the end of the lane that runs from Millend up to Cress Green. It was located just beyond the last cottage on the left. There are now only a few remnants left deep in the undergrowth. Howard suspects that the photo may have been taken by the Stonehouse photographer Frederick J Restall, who was active between c1910 to 1927.


Apparently the cottage was demolished in the early 1950s by Mr Keyes, who farmed the land at the time. It's been suggested that it may have taken its name from that of the field sometimes referred to as 'Bloody Vernal', a name that supposedly commemorates a 'battle' that took place there during the Civil War – probably no more than a bit of a scuffle!

History

Lost Cottages Contd...

The photograph of the second cottage carries the impressed mark of Walter G Lewis, an Eastington-based photographer.

He was born in 1874 and died in 1957 and was descended from a family that lived at Nupend.

We've not been able to identify this one so far. It may be that it has been demolished or modernised, changing its appearance.

Cotswold Canal Trust - Stroudwater Navigation Restoration



The Cotswold Canals Trust is working with SDC and other partners to restore the local canal network. The current phase of the project includes reinstating the waterway, locks, bridges and wetlands which were destroyed when the A38/A419 roundabout and the M5 were built in the 1960s. This is part of the so-called 'missing mile'.

£872,000 of development 'starter' money came from the National Lottery Heritage Fund in 2018, and the Trust will find out early next year if 'Cotswold Canals Connected' will receive all of the £9 million for the whole Stonehouse/Saul stretch from Lottery funding.

Much of the overall restoration work is being done by CCT volunteers but where the project crosses major rail or road infrastructure, the works will be professionally procured and undertaken by contractors.

In May 2019 Highways England awarded £4 million towards the infrastructure needed for restoration of the missing mile. The work required on the roundabout, as shown in the picture, has now been given the go-ahead and contractors and will commence work this month (December 2019).

The project will enhance historic features near to the M5 and A38, will increase biodiversity with more than 30 hectares of wildlife habitats, will improve flood prevention measures and will provide for community orchards. The scheme will also provide an off-carriageway pedestrian and cycle route through the roundabout.

No doubt some disruption to traffic will occur,

- but this time in a really worthwhile and eco-friendly cause!

Health Class Celebrates 8 Years at the Community Centre.



Chinese Medicine Practitioner and bestselling Author Christopher Handbury celebrates his 8th year of teaching his Qigong health and healing classes at the Eastington community centre.

Qigong is often described as 'energy work' or 'vital breath' and aims to restore the balance of the body and mind when illness and injury cause symptoms of physical and emotional pain. Christopher says, "we all need to learn ways to manage our health and to feel happy everyday so we can become our own doctors for better health... Qigong can show you how".

Following a car accident in 2002, which left him with a neck injury and years of chronic pain, Christopher found his

solution in the traditional medical practice of Qigong.



He has now been studying Qigong for the past 16 years and teaching locally for 10 years. He currently studies and trains with some of the worlds leading health systems and teachers. Last year he began publishing his teaching of Qigong, his book titled 'What is Qigong? A step-by step guide to growing a successful daily practice of Qigong' has become a best-selling book and received worldwide acclaim from other practitioners and students alike. His second book is due for release early 2020.

During Christopher's Qigong classes students learn how to treat and relieve many common symptoms of poor health, how to choose the right foods for the seasons to improve energy, which points on the body you can massage to treat pains and injuries and how to calm and restore harmony to the emotions so we can live a less stressful daily life. "We are a school that teaches you how to actively be part of your own health journey and have some fun along the way too!" he says.



Ecotricity – FGR Stadium

Second Planning Application and First Application Appeal



Ecotricity are trying our patience and soaking up Stroud DC planning staff time (and our money) by pursuing a twin-track of:

- 1. A second application, possibly to be heard in mid-December by SDC
- **2.** An appeal to H.M Inspectorate against refusal of the first application, scheduled for 18-21st February 2020

1. The Second Planning Application

There may or may not be a special meeting of the Development Control Committee for this application in mid December.

You can still send in objections on the Stroud DC planning website, reference S.19/1418/OUT.

In theory, although virtually identical, this will be treated as a new application, so you do need to make a new response.

Watch social media for announcements, in case there is a date fixed. When it is, you can attend the meeting at Ebley Mill. Last time both of our District Councillors, the Parish Council, KER and William Morris College all spoke against the stadium and there were two dozen people to support them - this counts with Councillors.

2. The Appeal (against the first application's refusal) and Public Hearing - Starting 18th February

This process is organised by the Government Inspectorate in Bristol but normally involves extensive preparation by both sides. Both Ecotricity and Stroud DC are likely to have solicitors and barristers to brief too - so this date really seems to have been set in unusual haste.

Previous objections/support will be presented to the inspector, and all people who previously responded should have been notified of the appeal date (over 250, we understand, but some seem to have been missed out.) You have until December 10th to add anything.

- If you DID object and have NOT been notified complain to Stroud DC planners on (01453) 754871
- By all means make an extra objection to the Inspector. Bear in mind that if FGR really want a 'Championship' stadium (as they say they do) they should be asking for 20,000+ seats to be considered try that for traffic!

The Parish Council will vote soon to appoint a specialist planning consultant to represent Eastington. He/she will collate all the objections since this whole saga kicked off in 2017 and attend the 4-day Public Hearing.

Anyone who has responded can attend the Public Hearing but you may be be limited to 3 minutes if you want to address the Inspector. It is really worth turning up for a session or two, however, to show the Inspector that we care.
