

From a report by John Newton Vice Chair, Cotswold Canals Trust

Heritage Fund grant £9 million to complete the Stroudwater canal restoration

Today the National Lottery Heritage Fund formally announced confirmation of a £9 million grant to enable reconnection of the canal to the national inland waterways network at Saul Junction, thereby enabling vessels to navigate to Stonehouse and then on to Stroud.

In 2018 Prince Charles opened the restored canal between Stroud and Stonehouse (Phase 1A, also made possible by a Lottery Heritage Fund grant) - but this section of canal has remained landlocked with no access to the rest of the UK canal system.



This additional funding (Phase 1B) will enable the major capital works to restore the canal to navigation by:

- reconstruction of the railway bridge at The Ocean, (pictured - programmed for May 2021),
- raising Walk Bridge on Whitminster Lane,
- constructing a canal channel under the M5 alongside the existing River Frome underpass,
- installing three new lift bridges for agricultural access across the canal
- reconnecting the canal and River Frome at two points on the Whitminster Section.
- restoration of six existing Heritage locks

Also required is to re-excavate a mile of new canal and build two new locks eastwards from the A38 roundabout through the fields to Westfield Lock in Eastington (pictured below).

This section of canal was destroyed when the M5 was constructed.

The current A38 roundabout canal works, now nearing completion, have been funded by Highways England in recognition of that previous destruction (see opposite page).

In addition to the major engineering works, extensive, on-going dredging will be required and some twenty-one hectares of new biodiversity habitats will be created, including reed beds, scrapes and orchards Wherever possible



a reconstructed 2-metre wide multi-use towpath will be established to optimise accessibility.

The historic canal archives, comprising some 100,000 documents dating from the original 1730's Company of Proprietors of The Stroudwater Navigation will be preserved and digitised for public access. These are believed to be the oldest continuous record of any canal company in the world.



This is a major community and volunteer-led project with a total value of some £23.5 million. It is the culmination of many years of commitment from the Cotswold Canals Trust and other organisations, including Stroud District Council together with Gloucestershire County Council, The Canal & River Trust and Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust.

CCT hopes to complete the restoration by December 2024. Importantly, this project will present major opportunities for further local investment and job creation, work training and skills together with improved health and lifestyles (both on the water and alongside it).

The Cotswold Canals Trust is a charity dedicated to eventually re-opening the complete length of canal between the Severn and the Thames and reconnecting Stroud will be a major step in that vision; we are always looking for new volunteers to assist in and enjoy our many activities.

By the time you read this, the amazing job of tunnelling under the Bristol Road (A38) roundabout will be finished and this channel will be full of (very deep) water. This is Highways England's way of saying "sorry we wrecked your canal in 1968". That is £4,200,000 worth of "sorry" and was the largest single donation to Phase 1B after the Heritage Lottery Fund.

And what happened to all the excavated soil? It went to Northleach to help to shore up a wall supporting the old A40. This had been closed since 2015 when cracks developed. Using the spoil from this project saved £700,000 worth of repairs!.

"I supported the application for £9m from the National Lottery Heritage Fund because I know the Cotswold Canals Connected Project would mean a great deal to Stroud in terms of leisure amenities, regeneration, tourism and employment opportunities. I am thrilled that this has been successful and look forward to seeing the dream becoming a reality.

"I believe this is now more important than ever as Stroud, the Valleys and Vale start to recover from the pandemic. It is a positive way to

encourage tourism, more exercise and healthier lifestyles too. We can become a fitter and thinner nation with projects like this. Congratulations to you all for your foresight, hard work and achievements to date, I am committed to continuing championing your efforts for our community."

Councils

District Councillors' News.

I'm sure you all know by now of the success by Cotswold Canals Connected in getting the funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the restoration of the Stroudwater Canal through Eastington, and onwards to Saul Junction. This will involve three years of hard work, which should come to fruition in 2024.

Work at the Whitminster roundabout is expected to be finished by the end of November, the next major project will be the upgrade of the railway bridge at The Ocean, behind Stonehouse Court Hotel, due for completion at the end of May next year. Hopefully, I can be on the first boat from Saul through to Stroud.

Stroud District Council is currently holding two consultations, both online, because of Covid-19.

The first is on additional housing options - www.stroud.gov.uk/localplanreview. This is to consult on land that may have to be added to that already consulted on, which ended in January of this year. If current extra figures for housing released by the Government are confirmed for the Stroud District, then the allocation Stroud will be expected to build up to 2040 will rise from 638 houses per annum to 786 p.a. This consultation includes 104 hectares of land in Whitminster, between the M5 and the A38, and substantial areas of land in Moreton Valence and Hardwicke, again, between the M5 and A38.

The second consultation is on Climate Change Action, and will include several online events to launch District Dialogues - www.stroud.gov.uk/draft2030strategy.

Both of these consultations end on December 16th. Everyone is invited to go online to have their say.

Because of the expanding roll-out of 3, 4 and 5G technology, there are likely to be more Mobile Phone etc masts springing up in the District. Not all of these masts have to get planning permission; some can be built as permitted development, provided a prior notification application is made to the Council. They have to meet the proper criteria to get consent, only appearance and siting can be objected to by the Council, which has a maximum of 56 days to approve any application, or the mast gets permission by default.

Both Stephen and John wish you all as Happy a Christmas as it is possible to have in these strange and trying times, and look forward to a much better 2021.

History

A Famous but Forgotten Eastingtonian - Rediscovered!

Last time we learnt about **Charles Alexander Hooper**, born in Eastington in 1869 who went on to become a leading character the world of rugby in the 1890s. His name recently came to light again via an amazing chance discovery....

Unfortunately, his initial was misspelt as an E!

Charles Alexander lived at Eastington Lodge with his parents, Charles and Julia Hooper, who ran the village cloth mills. In 1880 he attended Clifton College, prior to going to Cambridge University and finding fame on the rugby field. He later went on to work as a solicitor and, in 1914, emigrated to Hong Kong, serving in the Hong Kong Special Police Force during the First World War. He died in London in 1950, aged 81.

Now, why after all these years, has his name suddenly cropped up? It was one of those strange coincidences that I mentioned earlier and actually came to light as a result of a TV programme on one of Sky's more obscure channels. The programme, called *Irish Pickers*, essentially involves two men driving round Ireland buying and selling antiques and collectibles. On this particular occasion, they were at a fair in Bantry, a small town in the south of the country, where they came across a wooden box with a brass plaque engraved "C A Hooper". At this point, my ears pricked up – Hooper is not a common name and I wondered if there might be a connection with 'our' family.

The programme's researcher discovered that boys at Clifton College were issued with such boxes to hold their personal and valuable belongings – there was the link! It appears that the box was Charles Alexander's from his days at Clifton.





So, a purchase from a seaside flea market in Ireland triggered memories of a long-forgotten Eastingtonian rugby player who was good enough to represent his country. Let's face it, you've got to be good to get your own cigarette card - perhaps it's time to check granddad's cigarette card collection that's been languishing in the attic and see if you've got one of CAH!



Are you being scammed?

Citizens Advice Stroud & Cotswold has the following advice

- Be suspicious if you are contacted out of the blue, even if it's from a name you recognise
- If it sounds too good to be true it probably is
- Don't be rushed you never need to make a decision straight away!
 and if you feel pressured say "no", hang up the phone, or close the door
- Never give out your bank details unless you are certain you can trust the person contacting you,
 - remember that scammers are clever and can sound trustworthy
- Never respond to requests to make a bank transfer to a 'safe account'
- Your bank will never ask for your full PIN number or password over the phone
- Your bank will only use the last four digits on your card
- You may be asked to log onto your bank account via a link they will send you do not do this
- HMRC and TV Licensing will not email or text you about refunds or rebates, nor ask you for personal details
- Never click on links included in suspicious emails
- To check whether an email is genuine click on the arrow on the sender's email address, if it shows a personal email address or one which looks unusual be suspicious
- If you receive an email or text which you feel is suspicious open a new tab and do a search
- Look out for poor grammar or spelling
- Be suspicious of organisations which do not use your full name

You can register your landline with the Telephone Preference Service by calling **0345 070 0707**, which should reduce the amount of nuisance calls you get .

Talk to your phone provider to see what privacy services and call-blocking services are available. These services aren't always free but are useful in ensuring any call coming through is from a trusted or known source.

Coronavirus - be aware of new scams

It's important you're aware of the many new scams around at the moment because of coronavirus. Scams to look out for include:

- advertising face masks or medical equipment at high prices
- emails or texts pretending to be from the government
- emails offering life insurance against coronavirus
- people knocking at your door and asking for money for charity
- If you see emails or texts about coronavirus from someone you don't know, or from an unusual email address, don't click on any links or buy anything.

Don't give money or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust - for example someone who knocks on the door and offers to help.

History

Mrs Louisa Cowley - and a strange coincidence

Some of the older residents of the village will doubtless remember the late Mrs Louisa Cowley. Along with her husband Maurice, she lived in Eastington for most of her long and interesting life, a life than spanned three centuries!

Louisa was born in 1898 in the village of Berry Hill, a mile or so from Coleford in the Forest on Dean, one of no less than thirteen children. Times were doubtless hard, with her father and brothers working as miners in a nearby coal mine. Like many other youngsters at the time, at the age of 13, she left home, going to work as a domestic servant in Bristol. A year later, she was in service for the Capel family who lived at Oldbury House (now the Grange nursing home) in Eastington – the village was to become her home for almost the rest of her life.

On 23rd March 1918, she married Maurice Cowley in Eastington church. They continued to live in the village and subsequently had five children. Sadly, Maurice later lost his sight, an event that triggered Louisa's long-running involvement in helping others who had also become blind. For example, she often helped with fund raising and related activities, and each week, shepherded a party of blind people (including her husband) to a handicraft class in Stroud.

This was just one of her many undertakings and over the years, she became involved with numerous activities and organisations that included the British Legion, Infant Welfare, Womens' Institute, and the Methodist Church. For some years, she also held the post of school governor at Maidenhill School. She was a skilled needle worker and at home, made soft toys, crocheted, and embroidered. She was a regular prize winner at the Eastington Art & Handicrafts Show.

Louisa also had firm political beliefs, and for much of her life, was an active member of the Labour Party. In fact, she was a founder member of the Eastington branch in 1922, and carried on working as treasurer up to 1985 when the branch finally merged with Frampton. Remarkably, along with two friends, at the tender age of 91, she was invited to the House of Commons to view Prime Minister's Question Time and to meet David Blunkett and Labour Party leader Neil Kinnock. She had tea with the latter and they chatted for about 40 minutes. He later described Louisa and her two companions as "wonderful", saying that they represented the true values of the Party.

History

As her health began to suffer, in 1998, she eventually moved to the Cotswold House Care Home at Cainscross, where in 2000, a celebration was held for her 102nd birthday. She passed away later in the same year.

I was fortunate to meet Louisa, albeit briefly. About 35 years ago, we had a small history group in the village, and I was put in touch with her as someone with a long association with Eastington.



She had two volumes of the village magazine, covering the period June 1883 to December 1902 – these were originally her husband's.

They had been carefully bound by someone, an act that undoubtedly saved them from the bonfire.

The magazine was produced monthly by the local Temperance Association and unsurprisingly, filled many of its pages with reports on church and charitable events.

It also constantly warned the working man about the dangers of alcohol, the 'demon drink', and its potential consequences on working and family life.

Louisa showed me the two volumes and kindly allowed me to borrow them, but only for a day! As a result, I was only able to dip into a few of the magazines, but they provided many interesting snippets of village history that have since proved invaluable.

Remarkably, these two volumes resurfaced recently, when Louisa's granddaughter, Carol Sheppard of Tetbury, contacted Mike Naylor about another matter. She mentioned the volumes and asked if anyone would be interested in them – Mike kindly directed her to me and during our subsequent phone call, I realised that these were the same volumes that I had briefly examined all those years ago!

So, they are now back in the village, and I'm sure they will continue to provide some interesting insights on how our forefathers lived around the turn of the last century.

Many thanks to Mike for arranging the initial contact, and Carol for kindly donating the volumes. I've no doubt that they will be a rich source of material for future ECN articles.

Hibernation guide

Hibernation is a natural part of hedgehog lifecycles and the best place for healthy adult hedgehogs is out in the wild.



We only accept admissions of healthy hedgehogs that are too small to hibernate. (less than 450gm approx).

In mild weather please keep feeding hedgehogs (cat food – dry or wet and water) and in colder weather please do continue to put out clean water as all wildlife will benefit from this.

Here are our top 5 facts about hibernation:

- 1. Hedgehogs can hibernate successfully weighing as little as 450g
- 2. Hedgehogs only hibernate when temperatures drop below 5 degrees C
- 3. Hedgehogs emerge from hibernation when temperatures rise above 10 degrees C
- 4. Hedgehog heart rate decreases from 190 per minute to a 20 beats per minute
- 5. Hedgehog body temperature drops from 35 degrees C to 10 degrees C or less

You can help by building hedgehog houses or providing natural nesting spots in your garden. Hedgehogs like open compost heaps, brushwood and dry places under hedges and sheds. The nests need to be warm and dry. Providing dry leaves and hay for bedding will help the hedgehogs to create the best nest.

Please remember to be careful with bonfires. To hedgehogs, these looks like the perfect nest – please always build the bonfire on the day you are going to light it, or move the bonfire before you start and light on one side only to provide an escape route for animals that may otherwise get trapped inside.

In previous years volunteers have organised a group Halloween Walk around the village, however we were unable to do this in 2020 due to social distancing.

We therefore came up with the idea of a Halloween Trail during Autumn half term, 19th – 30th October, which could raise funds for Eastington School.

Dog Mess

We know that most of you are civilised people and pick up after your dog.

If you are not one of these people, yet, please read on.

You would not leave your own poo on people's doorsteps, or gardens or on the pavement, would you? Then why leave your dog's?? (Or allow your dog to roam free to do it). Dog waste, even from a very clean and well looked after dog, is more toxic than human waste, and a real danger to children and other animals.

The point is that a dog's digestive system can handle just about anything - and often does - which can make its output toxic without any harm to the dog. Even in the fields dog poo is a real problem. Amongst many other nasties, it can contain parasites, one of which can cause abortion in cows (and potentially in people too). At least one of our local farmers has lost calves this way.

Horse and cow waste consists mostly of grass and water and breaks down quickly so is much less of a problem. The output from your dog, on the other hand, can hang around for a long time, breeding bacteria all the while.

Please bag it up and dispose of properly in litter bins or your dustbin. Thank you.

Fireworks

This is a another subject which has caused much debate lately - around bonfire night, of course, but this will apply at New Year - and other celebrations as well when the noise may be least expected.

The first thing to remember is that fireworks are dangerous. Every year in the UK, children are injured and over 100 fires in homes and buildings are caused by fireworks.

In addition, the noise of explosions causes an immense amount of distress and even death to wildlife, farm animals and pets. Not to mention the farmers, the pet owners and anyone with PTSD.

We know that fireworks are pretty, and you may enjoy them - but please spare a thought for those you are harming while you do so. Always take the trouble to warn those around you if you intend letting off fireworks - and make sure that you get them from a reputable, licensed source, for your own safety.

Some of the damage they do can be reduced by choosing the lower noise versions - they can be just as pretty and enjoyable. There is currently a petition for parliament to consider limiting the permitted maximum noise from firework explosions which you may care to consider signing -

There seems to be a widespread fear that Christmas will be cancelled this year or truncated to the point that it loses much of its value. The gift of the birth of Jesus Christ cannot be cancelled by the presence of a virus even if it has the capacity to cause mayhem and misery – but Christmas can be ignored or relegated to a level of minimal importance somewhere below that of the crackers and Christmas Tree by our own actions and priorities.

SO WHAT IS HAPPENING THIS CHRISTMAS?

At this time of year we are usually in a position to publicise our Christmas events programme with some confidence that it will happen as expected. That is not so easy this year.

Meanwhile, back to Christmas, and subject to the regulations allowing them:-

All Age Christmas Services – Sunday 6th and 20th December at 11am at the Church. The one on the 6th will be taken by our minister, Rev Phil Summers, who is very skilled in the performing arts.

Messy Christmas – Tuesday 22nd December 10:30am – noon. We are unable to run this in the usual way with 50+ people crowded into the building so <u>pre-booking will be essential</u> to enable us to manage the numbers; please contact Roz, our Youth & Families Worker (contact details below).

Christmas Day – Friday 25th December at 10:30am. An opportunity to worship and experience the true meaning of Christmas together. This will be at the church which will have socially distanced seating and, unless the regulations are changed, we will have to listen to carols rather than sing them.

Christmas Messy Moss – These are outdoor bookable free family sessions for 5 to 11 year olds and their families. They will have a Christmas theme involving the natural world and be subject to a maximum of 5 people taking part plus Roz as leader. These will be run in Brownings orchard, the local Snakey Park (OHMG) or in your own garden and run for approximately one to one and a half hours at an agreed time over the course of the Christmas School holidays. There will be a range of activities from simple games, to crafts related to the outdoors, wildlife spotting and quiet contemplation. Messy Moss is expected to remain available by arrangement beyond the holiday period exploring other themes and can be booked for after school or on a Saturday. All COVID-19 requirements will be followed appropriate to outdoor activities. Again please contact Roz, our Youth & Families Worker (contact details below).

For those attending any events in the building: masks must be worn (except by young children and those who are exempt), hand sanitisation facilities are provided and other COVID-19 precautions apply.

As one might expect, Youth Club will not be running on Christmas Day or New Year's Day.


Everyone is welcome to attend, although due to COVID-19, people in vulnerable groups are discouraged from attending.

FUNDRAISING APPEAL FOR CHURCH ROOF

You may have recently noticed some scaffolding at the front of the church. This is in relation to a leak over the pulpit. Following some initial investigations, it is clear that a patch repair, similar to other leaks is not going to be possible. A large area of the roof is defective and in a very fragile condition. Extensive and costly repairs will be required, which will be well beyond our financial resources.

The situation is very serious and some action will be taken immediately. A local conservation architect is providing some very helpful and useful advice on how to proceed, together with further meetings to investigate in more detail the full extent of the necessary repair work.

The likely outcome is that we will have to provide some temporary protection to the roof before drawing up a specification of repair work and investigating grants. The architect suggests the process of raising funds and undertaking this work could take two years or so to complete. We will probably need to engage somebody (hopefully on a voluntary basis) who is competent to coordinate the fundraising.
